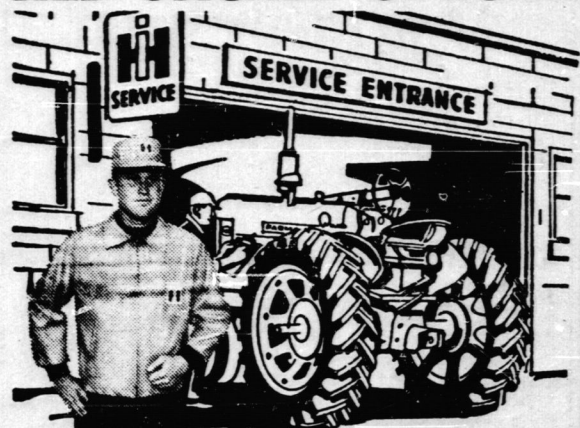

**NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS**

By-law No. 279 of the Village of Jarvis, enacted March 19, 1968 states in part:

1. The owner of every dog shall prevent same from running at large at any time of the year, within the limits of the Corporation of the Village of Jarvis.

2. Any dog running at large contrary to the provisions of this By-law may be seized and impounded by any police constable of the Village of Jarvis, or a duly appointed dog control officer, and then be sold or destroyed as hereinafter provided:

So that By-law 279 shall be fully enforced, the Council of the Village of Jarvis has duly appointed a dog control officer with full authority to enforce the provisions of the said By-law. The appointed dog control officer commences his duties February first 1969. Dog owners are asked to govern themselves accordingly.

**Selkirk Women Killed In Crash**

SELKIRK — A Selkirk woman was killed and three men were injured in a crash at the intersection of Haldimand County Rds. 11 and 34, Saturday.

Dead on arrival at West-Haldimand General Hospital was Mrs. Alice Banks, 68 of Selkirk.

Injured were her husband William Banks, 69, with back and head injuries; Robert Marshall 25, of R.R. 1, Jarvis, facial lacerations and rib injuries and Robert Harris, 34, of R.R. 1, Fisherville, head and neck injuries. Harris was a passenger in the Marshall vehicle.

There was \$1,000 damage to the Marshall vehicle and \$1,500 to the Banks vehicle.

Police said the Banks vehicle turned directly in front of the Marshall vehicle. Marshall was eastbound on County Rd. 11 and the Banks car was westbound when the accident occurred.

Const. Robert Adams, Cayuga OPP, investigated the accident reported at 6 p.m.

**Notes For The Area Farmer**

In his presentation to the Soil and Crop Improvement Association's Annual Meeting, Karl Benz proposed the farmers of this area should check alfalfa fields about every second day starting before June 1st. If damage by the alfalfa weevil reaches the point where 25 per cent of the plants are affected something should be done quickly. This is not possible, if the alfalfa weevil is used at an estimated \$4.00 per acre. Before making this decision one would have to be sure that the right insecticide was used and that it is in bloom and bees would be affected. When the time comes, it is proposed that information be checked at the Agricultural Office.

During the Crop Improvement Annual Meeting results of the Crop Cost Studies completed in Haldimand and other Niagara Counties were discussed by Lyall MacLachlan, Extension Branch Farm Management Specialist. For the 1968 season returns over cost were: Averages were \$21.80 per acre for barley \$42.28 for wheat, \$31.07 for corn, and \$13.80 for oats. The widest range occurred with the corn crop where profit per acre varied from \$78.52 to a loss of \$11.69 per acre. Time was limited for discussion of the subject.

The Haldimand Crop Cost Study participants will be meeting soon for a detailed discussion of the results. Considerable discussion or argument if you like is expected at this meeting. In any case it will certainly be an enlightening experience that more Haldimand farmers should consider for 1969.

The Farm Income Committee's Report was discussed at the Crop Improvement Annual Meeting as well. Participants Keith Richardson, Allan Murray, John Albin and Arthur Bradford were certainly agreed that there is a lot in this
