

## Stelco Starts First Stage

The Steel Company of Canada has begun its first stage of development of its Lake Erie property in Haldimand and Norfolk Counties.

### Summer Garden Ballroom Sold

The Port Dover Summer Garden, owned by Mr. Don C. Ivey, has been sold to two Hamilton businessmen.

Mr. Ivey announced last week that he had sold the building, land and equipment to Messrs. Sidney Sinclair and Michael McLaughlin of Hamilton.

The sale was effective July 1st.

The Summer Garden has been a popular dance spot since it was opened in 1920 by A. Benson Ivey.

Don Ivey assumed full control and ownership of the business from his father about 25 years ago. He has operated the Summer Garden continuously and successfully since then and brought many big name bands to Port Dover.

Mr. Sinclair owns a restaurant business and plans to develop this further in the Summer Garden complex.

He and Mr. McLaughlin have other business interests as well, including wholesale and retail stores in Hamilton.

Late last week two area contractors, Elgin Mitchell of Jarvis, and George Culver of Dunnville, began plugging 18 natural gas wells on a 500-acre segment north of the Rainham Road.

This work is being done to allow for preliminary land grading which will start about mid-August.

The land grading will include general land levelling.

excavation of the basement for the 80" hot strip mill and some road construction and is expected to be completed before the arrival of winter.

Stelco announced plans a year ago for the construction of their \$200 million continuous hot strip mill and purchased 6600 acres of land for the development.

The strip mill is scheduled to become operational in 1973.

Charles Pearce, who was elected secretary, said businessmen and others in the immediate area have been thinking along the lines of a board of trade or chamber of commerce for some time and just needed someone to get things rolling.

Many years ago, according to Mr. Pearce, there was a merchants group, but it went defunct when merchants could not agree on store closing hours.

Mr. Pearce said the immediate need is membership and David Banks was appointed chairman. Mr. Johnson is chairman of the government affairs committee.

## Cpl Park Replaces Cpl Ambeau

The Cayuga Detachment investigated a total of 15 accidents during the period of June 15-21, 1969. Of these 15 accidents, 6 were personal injury causing injuries to 16 persons. This was an increase of 13 accidents over the previous week.

Officers patrolled a total of 5,040 miles during the period and issued 31 warnings and 19 charges to motorists for infractions of the Highway Traffic Act and its Regulations. One person was charged with Impaired Driving. In Provincial Judges Court on June 18th, 15 convictions were registered for this detachment.

General occurrences investigated by this Detachment were 4 thefts, 2 break and enters and 12 requests for assistance.

Constable J. Edmondson is investigating the drowning of Douglas Edward Steward of Mt. Hope whose body was recovered in the Grand River near Caledonia on June 15, 1969. No decision has been made as yet regarding an inquest. Four persons were reported missing during the past week and all have been located.

Constables P. Wood, M. Malseed, J. Termorshuizen and Corporal E. Park apprehended a wanted person, George White, age 30 yrs, in Canboro Township, June 18, 1969. White was wanted by Brantford OPP and Wainfleet Township Police for various charges. White was arrested after a

high speed chase on Canboro Township roads.

A change in personnel took place at this Detachment when Corporal W.J. Ambeau was transferred to No. 4 District Headquarters at Niagara Falls.

Corporal Ambeau had been stationed at this Detachment for the last 2 years. Replacing Corporal Ambeau is Corporal E. Park who had been stationed at Niagara Falls for the last year. Prior to that,

Corporal Park spent 13 years at Brantford and 2 years at Belleville Detachments.

Corporal Park is a native of Hanover, Ontario, and is married with one child. He plans to take up residence in Cayuga.


The head office of Western Ontario Breeders Inc. will be at Woodstock at the former

It has been brought to our attention that there is some misunderstanding as to the proper method of handling, for capital cost allowance purposes, capital items on which Capital Grants have been claimed.

When a grant is received which reduced the cost of a capital asset such as a silo or milk house, the amount received must be deducted from the total cost before capital cost allowance is calculated. (See 1968 Farmer's and Fisherman's Tax Guide, Page 13, paragraph 2).
