## Study Garbage Disposal

Haldimand Municipal Officials scrutinized a sketch plan for garbage disposal at a meeting called by Dunnville Mayor Charles Lundy.

The meeting was called in light of garbage disposal problems in the county's east end, particularly open burning.

The plan consists of a 960-cubic-yard open pit burner that reduces garbage to within five or 10 per cent of its original volume. It reduces glass to rice-like particles and tin cans to dust.

The problem was created earlier this year when the

Department of Health and Welfare reminded the municipalities that burning garbage in municipal dumps is a violation of the Air Pollution Control Act. The Act prohibits open burning without the permission and direction of a provincial office.

Ron Borkosky, an engineer with Whiting Equipment Ltd. of Welland, which makes the open pit burner, and David Cohen, president of the industrial disposal division of the Scrap Iron and Metal Co. Ltd. of Port Colborne, which operates the burner, recommended two burners for Haldimand.

They said the machines would cost \$25,000 apiece and would each gobble up 60 tons of garbage per eight hour work day.

It was suggested that one unit be located in Dunnville and the other in Walpole Township or Caledonia to reduce trucking expenses.

A report to county council will be made later this year pertaining to tonnage rates of garbage for each individual municipality.

## Four Flights Daily

An increase in the frequency of flights between Montreal and Hamilton, starting Monday, July 14, was announced today by Nordair.

The Montreal-based airline has been providing twice a day direct jet service on weekdays between the two cities since early May. The

decision to step-up the service to 4 flights every weekday, as well as 4 flights on weekends, was prompted by the growing acceptance of the service by the travelling public.

"It's as a result of the excellent response to our present service that we decided to go for more frequent flights at this time," stated Mr. R.G. Lefrançois, President. "The steady increase in numbers of passengers flying with us is most gratifying, and our new Boeing 737 jets have been extremely popular with our passengers. We find the one hour flight between cities a real time-saver for our passengers and a great convenience for travellers from the Hamilton region. Likewise our flights have made it easier for Montreal businessmen to make those early morning calls."

Nordair is a scheduled airline and provides scheduled service through Northern Quebec and the Eastern Canadian Arctic.

## Wise, Unwise And Otherwise

The Investiture of Charles as Prince of Wales has attracted a great deal of attention this week and it is interesting to see what lies behind it.

Wales has always been different from the other parts of the British Isles and, in spite of being dominated by English speaking people, has retained her own language and customs. After the Romans conquered the island Christianity was introduced and was accepted by the Welsh about the year 200 A.D. The invasion of the heathen Angles, Saxons and Danes forced the Celtic people to flee to the western parts of the island of Great Britain, and Wales became the stronghold of the Celtic people and the Christian religion. This was after the time of Arthur, about 500 A.D.

Then followed a long period of rival princes and nobles at war amongst themselves and constantly repelling the advances of the English. Finally, around 1275 the Welsh national hero Llywelyn ap Griffith, united the nation. Unfortunately for him the English King at that time was Edward I, one of England's best kings. He was defeated and killed. King Edward offered his new born son to the Welsh people as their new Prince and ever since then Wales has been more or less a part of England which is what the Welsh Nationalists so strongly oppose.

However, the Welsh have had their influence on the English people, too. The English King, Henry V, in 1420 married the French princess, Katherine. When he died two years later she married a Welsh nobleman named Owen Tudor, His son, Edmund, married the princess Margaret who was the grandmother of Henry VIII. In his reign an Act of Union made Wales an integral part of England. Another great Welshman was David Lloyd George who became Prime Minister of England and Wales during World War I and was a great contributor to the British victory in that war. It is interesting to note that it was he who introduced Old Age Pensions, which were later copied by many other nations, including Canada.

The Welsh were not very favourable to the Reformation but the Protestant religion was forced on them by the Church of England. This union of Church and State lasted until recent years when the "Church of Wales" was organized with the Welsh people as

Archbishop of St. David's as its head. In the meanwhile the religious situation had completely changed. Around the year 1735 the Wesleyan, or Methodist, revival came to Wales and was eagerly accepted by the people who have continued loyal to it ever since. I think they now outnumber the adherents of the Church of Wales.

## Discussions On Municipal Government

A team of Ontario cabinet ministers will hold a "Frank Province and the informal" dialogue municipalities so that both session on municipal levels of government could government reform at a properly grasp each other's special meeting in Simcoe on July 31.

The meeting is the first of a series of dialogue discussions being arranged summer as a further means of two-way communication between Queen's Park and municipalities.

Officials from all municipalities in Haldimand, Norfolk, Oxford, and Brant counties have been invited to the Simcoe meeting.

The cabinet ministers taking part in the dialogue series will discuss the new Assessment Act and other aspects of municipal reform proposed by the Provincial Government. At the same time the ministers will ask local officials for first-hand information on their needs and views.

Provincial Treasurer Charles MacNaughton and Municipal Affairs Minister Darcy McKeough plan to attend all meetings in the series. Other cabinet ministers, including Prime Minister John Roberts, will participate in some of the meetings.

Mr. Roberts announced the dialogue series on June 25 at the annual conference of the Association of Ontario Mayors and Reeves.

"I hope these meetings will be informal and frank and that they will allow for complete give and take between the representatives of the Government of Ontario and the local elected and appointed people," Mr. Roberts said.

## Ban Termed Discrimination

Two Canadian advertising and broadcasting associations cry "discrimination" regarding the Department of Health and Welfare's proposal to ban cigarette advertising on radio and TV news medias.

The FCASC resolution reads: "Whereas the elimination of advertising of any particular product on any selected media by the Province — provincial taxation, provincial aid to Government of Canada is considered discriminatory; "Be it resolved that the Federation of Canadian Advertising and Sales Clubs in national general meeting support the view of the Canadian Association of Broadcasters that:

(a) If Parliament is convinced that there is a clear and present danger to the health of the Canadian public because of cigarette smoking, Parliament should prohibit the sale of cigarettes entirely.

(b) The problem cannot be solved, whatever its nature, by the prohibition of cigarette advertising on radio and television, while such advertising continues in all other media, both here and abroad.

(c) If Parliament considers the sale of a product both legal and acceptable, it is in a difficult position if it asserts that such a product cannot be advertised, especially if it selects only the two broadcast media for such prohibition.

The associations' stand would indicate that few private radio or TV stations plan to follow the CBC's lead and voluntarily refuse cigarette ads unless legislation forces them to do so.
