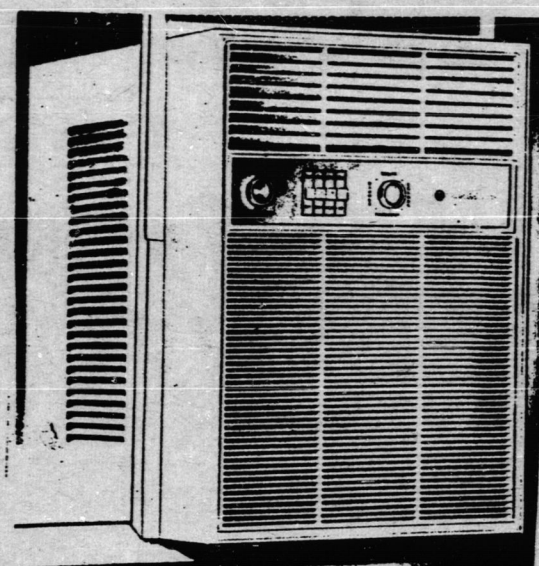

"In the Department of Soil Science," explains Dr. Miller, "our primary concern we operate for the Ontario

is to see that each piece of land is used for its best purpose, to get the most efficient production from each agricultural acre. The Ontario Soil Survey, a joint program with the Canada Department of Agriculture, has enabled us to formulate maps that show the general areas of the various soil types in the province.

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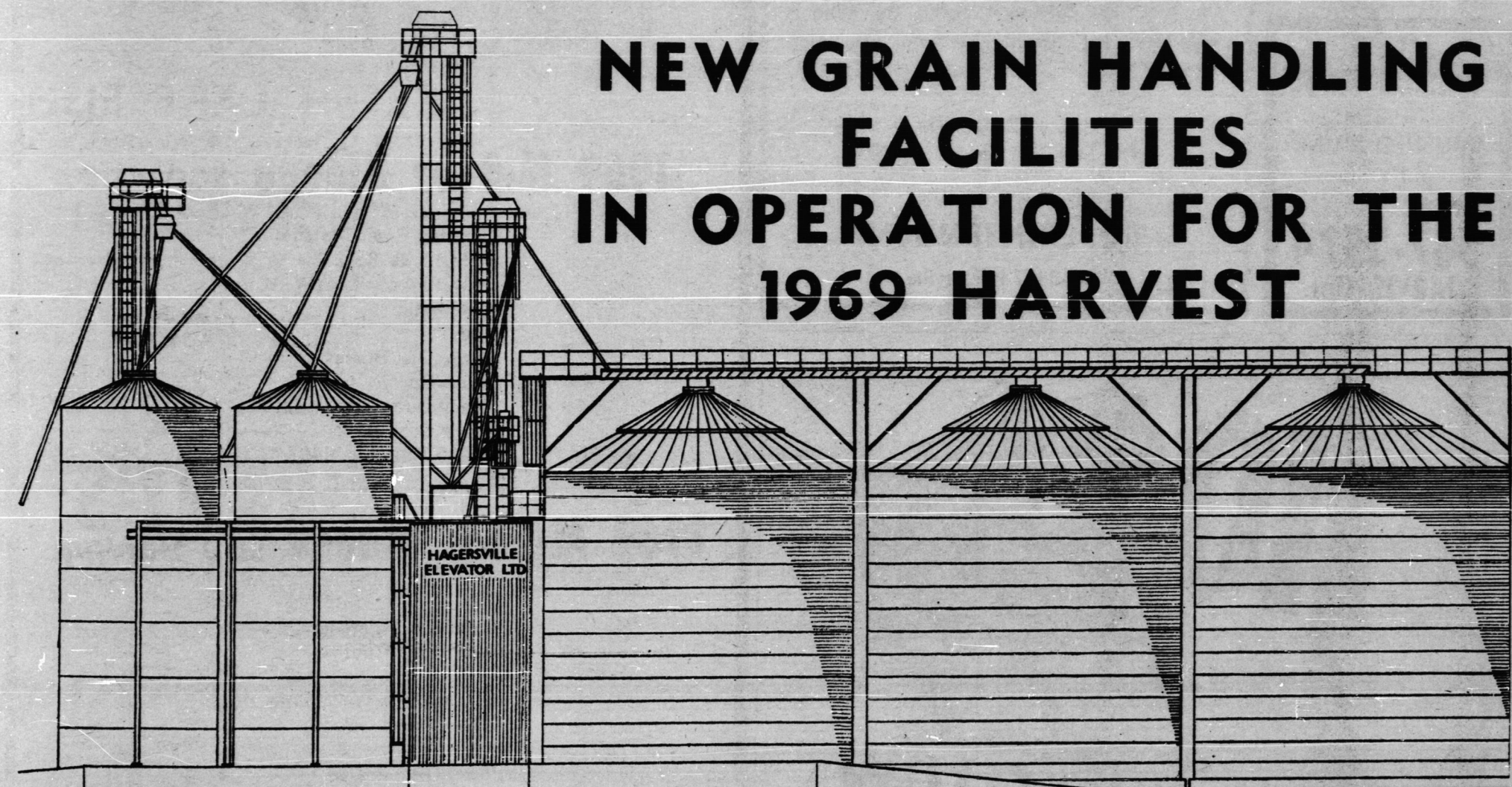
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
