Officials To Meet Cabinet Ministers

Local Municipal Officials will meet with Ontario Cabinet Ministers in a "frank and informal" dialogue session on municipal government reform at a special meeting in Simcoe on July 31.

The dialogue discussion is a further means of two-way communications between Queen's Park and Municipalities.

The cabinet ministers will discuss the new assessment act and at the same time will ask local officials for first-hand information on their needs and views.

John Robarts, Premier of Ontario, announced the meetings and said "I hope these meetings will be informal and frank and that they will allow for complete give and take between the representatives of the Government of Ontario and the local elected and appointed people."

The meeting is scheduled for 2:30 p.m.

Banks Accept UIC Monthly Contributions

OTTAWA — Close to 200,000 of the 450,000 employers registered with the Unemployment Insurance Commission of Canada will soon pay their monthly contributions directly to chartered banks and certain other financial institutions, it was announced.

The purpose of this innovation, effective October 1st, is to make it easier for employers using the bulk payment method to make their payments. Negotiations with the various institutions have been going on since January 1969 and are still continuing.

New remittance forms have been designed to replace the old and will be sent out to all employers using the bulk payment method in the month of September. These forms will be filled out in duplicate so that when the employer pays he will receive a receipted copy of his remittance for his records.

There is no charge to the employer for this new service. He is not required to pay exchange if he is obliged to send remittance money to some other city.

Under the new arrangements, the employer sends the money to his own financial institution, either by cheque or cash, or he arranges to have his account automatically debited when he sends the remittance form in. The money then goes to the agency of the Bank of Canada where it is deposited to the credit of the UIC.

If the employer's present banking facilities do not come under the new agreement, he can deal with any chartered bank. But in this case the bank will probably want a certified cheque, cash or a money order.

Joins Agr. And Food Staff

Information has been received that Charles Sterling, a 1969 graduate of the University of Alberta in Animal Science will join the Haldimand staff of the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food starting July 2nd.

Harold Bentley of this office is to become associate agricultural representative. Both of these young men, while continuing to have responsibility for the 4-H and Junior Farmer work of the county, will assume larger roles in the Farm Management work that has become so important to farmers of the county in recent years.

Hugh Greenfield, Reeve of the Township of Walpole and a member of the county's roads committee, told county council last week it was "favourable", although he

could not release details at the present time.

Plans were announced last month for closing Norfolk County Road six within Stelco limits and three miles of Haldimand County Road (Rainbow Road).

These roads would be replaced by a new road a mile to the north.

The financial problem arose over who should pay what amount for re-construction.

Haldimand officials believe Stelco should pay the county reasonable compensation for new roads located on Stelco land, and in addition pay the county reasonable compensation for closing the Rainbow Road.

This compensation would subsidize construction on just over half-a-mile of Walpole Concession Road Two, at least two bridges must be built.

Provincial Police Report

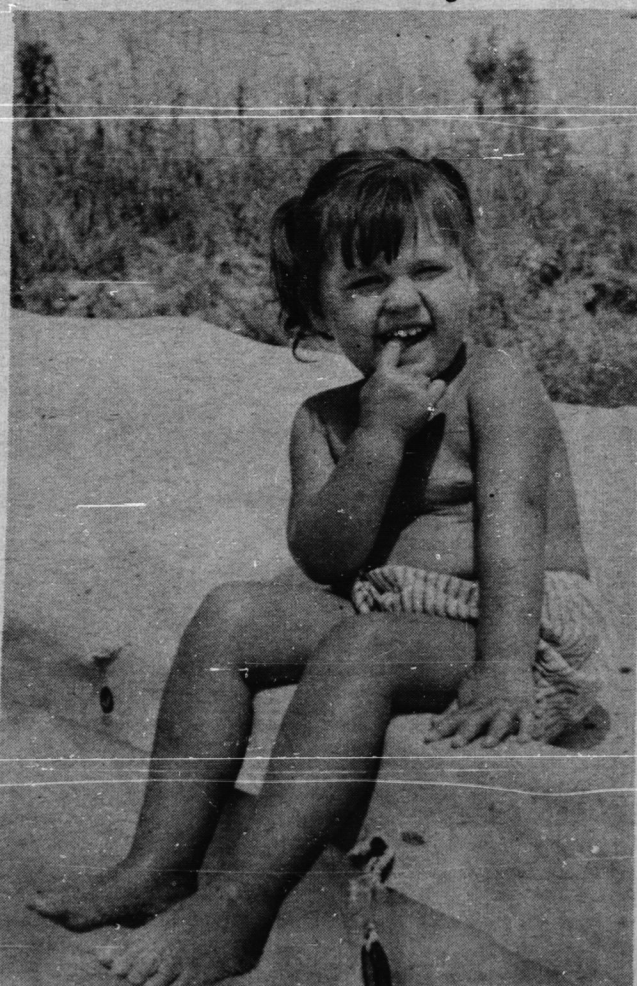
The Cayuga Detachment reports the sixth and seventh traffic fatalities in Haldimand County for 1969 — occurred the week of July 13-19.

Jacobus Sandee age 26, Aikman Ave. Hamilton, was fatally injured on July 14 on No. 11 County Road, Dunn Twp. Sandee was operating a motorcycle and was in collision with a vehicle operated by Claude Haggerty, R.R. No. 6 Dunnville. Constable R. Propalia and Cpl. J.P. Helferty are in charge of this investigation.

Jannie Hollis age 35, Buffalo NY, fatally injured on July 16, passenger in her husband's vehicle, on No. 3 Hwy., Moulton Twp. (Constable R.C. Hofrichter and Cpl. P.J. Helferty are in charge of this investigation) These accidents make a total of 9 persons killed to this

date, for 1969, on Highways policed by this Detachment. Officers also investigated 13 other accidents, one injury accident with one person injured. This was a decrease of two over the previous week. Officers patrolled a total of 5,020 miles during this period, issuing 19 warnings and 21 charges to motorists. In Provincial Judge's Court, July 16, 1969, 30 convictions were registered for this Detachment.

General occurrences reported and investigated during the past week were: 6 thefts, 3 break and enters, 3 assaults, 5 other criminal offences and answered 12 requests for assistance. As a result of 3 liquor control act investigations, 3 persons have been charged.
