OTTAWA — The stepped-up investigation program of the Unemployment Insurance Commission yielded \$3,156,807 during the financial year ended March 31, 1969.

A spokesman for the Commission said that a recovery target of \$3,000,000 had been set at the start of the year 1968-69 fiscal year, and represented an estimate of what could be achieved by the stepped-up program during the year.

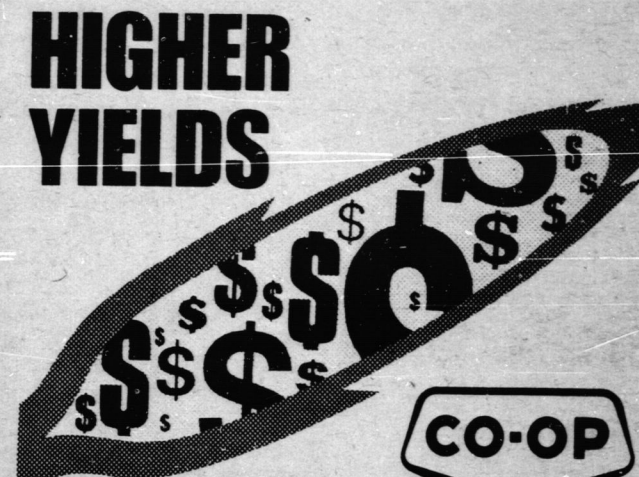

Ontario Hydro has awarded a half-million dollar contract to Aldershot Contractors Equipment Rental Limited of Burlington for construction of a 200-acre ash lagoon at its Nanticoke generating station.

The lagoon is an innovation for Ontario Hydro and is designed to filter the waste ash from the station. It will have sufficient capacity to meet the total ash disposal requirements for the life of the plant.

The ash will be transported from the station to the lagoon by water through a complex piping system.

The transporting water will undergo two purifying stages, allowing solids to settle before being returned to the lake. The discharge water will be scrutinized

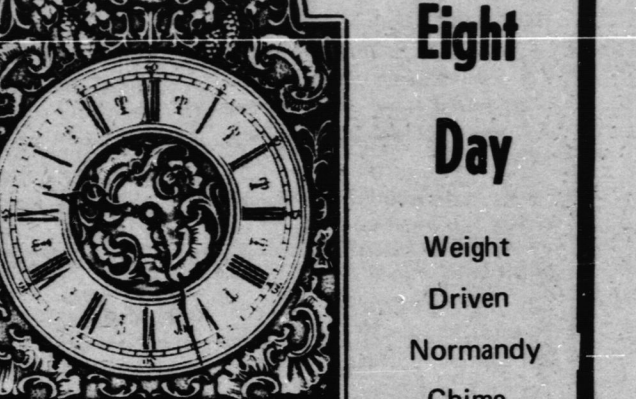
Free Vaccination Clinics

Free Anti-Rabies Vaccination Clinics will be conducted in Haldimand County from June 16 to June 20, inclusive. The clinics will be conducted by the Health of Animals Branch of the Canada Department of Agriculture, in co-operation with the Council of the County of Haldimand.

The vaccinations will be available to any dogs and cats with the only restrictions being that dogs must be on a leash, accompanied by an adult, and cats are to be properly restrained. Pets may be vaccinated in Jarvis on Wednesday, June 18 from 1:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. at the Fire Hall.

The clinics have been prompted by an increase in rabies cases in the area over the last few months. The most common cases are found in skunks, fox and similar wild life.
