How Much To Appeal

Q. When I lost my job in a factory at Moncton, I filed a claim to get my Unemployment Insurance. I received a notice advising me that my benefits were being withheld for six weeks due to the fact that I had "lost my employment on account of misconduct".

I went to see my lawyer, but he told me that the only thing I could do was to appeal the decision to a Board of Referees.

If I do appeal, how long will I have to wait before I know what their decision is? I would also like to know how much it will cost me to appeal.

A. The time lag depends on the number of appeals the Board of Referees has to hear in your area.

In Moncton appeals are generally heard by the board within a month of the date they are lodged at the office.

So if you decide to appeal, you will probably wait up to one month to have your appeal heard and one to two days more before you are notified of the decision.

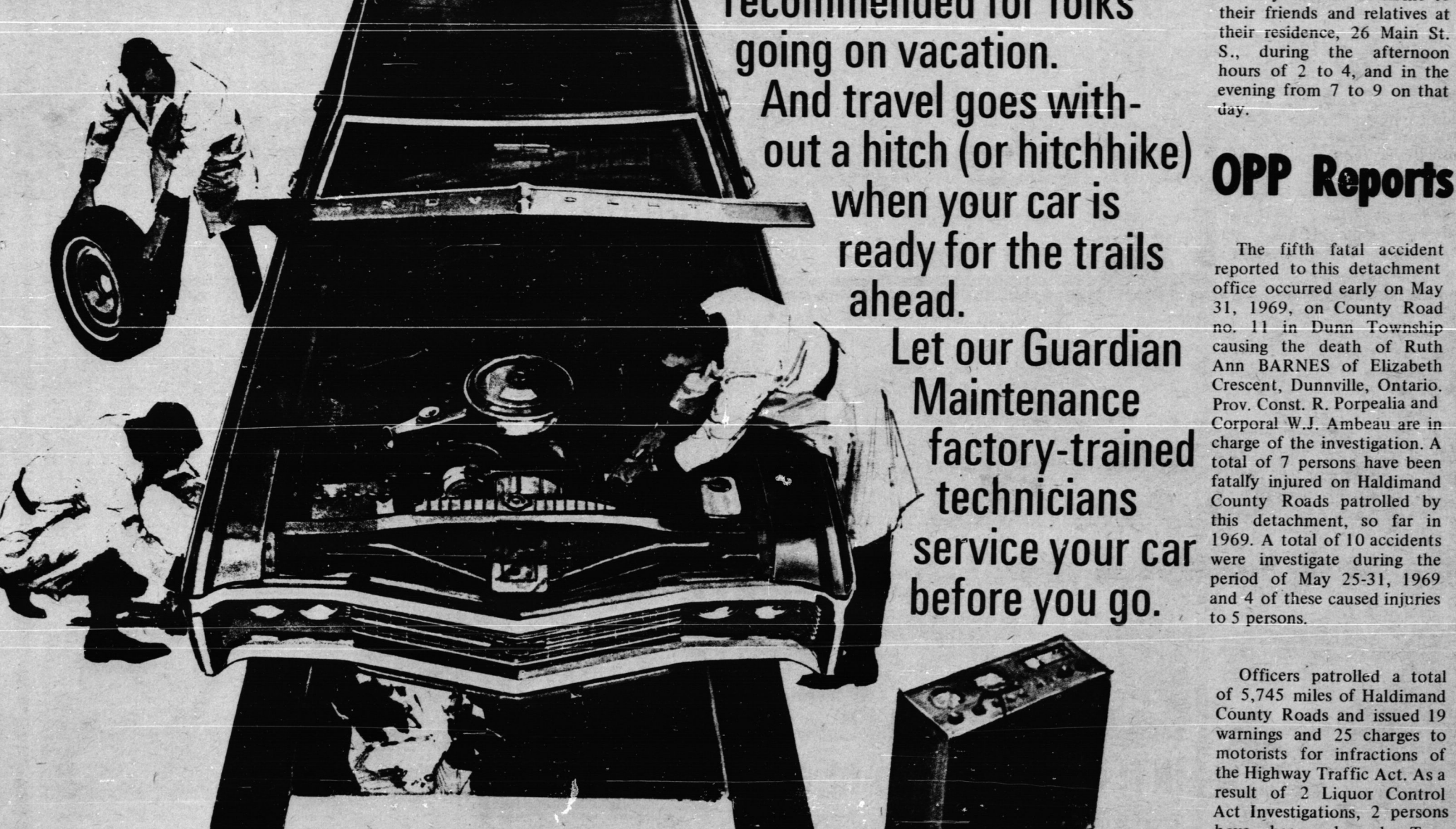

OPP Reports

The fifth fatal accident reported to this detachment office occurred early on May 31, 1969, on County Road no. 11 in Dunn Township causing the death of Ruth Ann BARNES of Elizabeth Crescent, Dunnville, Ontario. Prov. Const. R. Porpealis and Corporal W.J. Ambeau are in charge of the investigation. A total of 7 persons have been fatally injured on Haldimand County Roads patrolled by this detachment, so far in 1969. A total of 10 accidents were investigated during the period of May 25-31, 1969 and 4 of these caused injuries to 5 persons.

Officers patrolled a total of 5,745 miles of Haldimand County Roads and issued 19 warnings and 25 charges to motorists for infractions of the Highway Traffic Act. As a result of 2 Liquor Control Act Investigations, 2 persons have been charged. Two persons were charged with Impaired Driving. In Provincial Judges Court on May 29, 1969, 46 convictions were registered for this detachment.

General occurrences investigated during the past week were as follows: 5 thefts, 2 break and enters, 1 assault and officers answered 18 requests for assistance. Constable M. Tatarnic recovered a stolen car from Port Colborne in Oneida Township.

Young Voyageurs Travel

The Young Voyageurs travel and exchange program will give 624 Ontario secondary school students the chance to visit one of Canada's other nine provinces this summer.

Education Minister William G. Davis notified Secretary of State Gerard Pelletier this week of Ontario's continued participation in the program which was started by the Centennial Commission in 1964.

The Ontario Department of Education is organizing Ontario's contingent into 26 groups for week long visits to the other provinces during July and August. One group will visit Newfoundland and another Labrador City.

During the two months Ontario will host 26 similar groups from the other provinces, the Yukon and the Northwest Territories. More than 15,000 secondary school students have taken part in the Young Voyageur program in the past five years.

Aim for the program is to provide students with the opportunity for travel outside their own province and to learn firsthand Canada's geography, political and educational institutions and its cultural and industrial achievements.

Schools participating in the program are chosen on a regional basis and selection is usually limited to one student per school. Students must be between 15 and 17 years of age and preference is given to those in Grade 11. They are nominated by their principal and teachers.

Dr. And Mrs. Krouse To Visit U.S.S.R.

Dr. H. Roy Krouse, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Krouse Jarvis, an Associate Professor of Physics at the University of Alberta, Edmonton, is visiting the Soviet Union for five weeks during June and July. He is going on behalf of the National Research Council of Canada as an exchange visitor to the Academy of Sciences, U.S.S.R. While there he will spend some time visiting a number of Stable Isotope Laboratories and also giving lectures on the research he has been conducting at the University of Alberta.

He is accompanied by his wife Irene and son Donald. Irene has an M.A. from the University of Alberta in Slavic Linguistics and is looking forward to using her training during this visit. They will cross the Atlantic on the Russian ship Alexandre Pushkin.
