Residents Fed Up

Residents of Hagersville's West End are completely fed up with Council's efforts to install water and sewage services in their section of town. Many residents have been attending Council Meetings regularly for the past six months but have received no satisfaction at all. They have been fighting for the services ever since 1966 when they were extended up King Street as far as the Railroad tracks but no farther.

However, the issue came to a head a few months ago when several wells in the area were condemned by the Ontario Water Resources Commission. Since that time the residents have been carrying their drinking water from Northview Public School on Main St., North. Tony Yacabino, one West-End homeowner who has been attending the council meetings, said they are "not even trying hard to install the services."

"We don't seem to be getting anywhere with Council" he said. "All they have been doing for the past six months is passing the buck," he added. Mr. Yacabino said Council passed it to the OMB and the OMB passed it to the County Health Board. A few weeks ago the OWRC sampled wells in the area but no report has been issued as yet. He said the report should have been received in "a week or ten days, but it has been well over a month." He said "it may help when some young child becomes seriously ill, but then it will be too late."

To Study Effects Of Steel Complex

A group of geographers from McMaster University, under the direction of Dr. L. G. Reeds, have commenced a study of the probable effects of the Steico complex to be developed at Nanticoke on the agricultural industry of the surrounding area.

The research team will be focusing their attention this year on the immediate vicinity of the plant, including Walpole township and the mixed farming area of Woodhouse township.

The main object of the investigation is to gain an understanding of the opinion of farmers regarding the future of farming in the area. Mr. David Maas and Mr. Eugene Chambers will be interviewing a selected group of farmers during the month of June. They will be interested in learning about past trends and the farmers' plans for the future.

The findings of this project will be made available to Mr. Nigel Richardson, The Department of Municipal Affairs planner who is the director of the Haldimand-Norfolk study, and who is responsible for developing a comprehensive plan of development for the two counties.

GFO Vote On June 24

The June 24 vote on a General Farm Organization offers the best opportunity to date for individual farmers to participate in setting up a farm organization to serve their needs.

This was one message Malcolm Davidson, Brucefield, chairman of the GFO Campaign Committee stressed at a meeting in Brantford on June 6.

"The meeting of county committee chairman and was one of a series to officially launch the final drive in the campaign to urge farmers to set up a GFO in Ontario.

"The kickoff meetings across Ontario will be followed by public rallies

with top flight speakers in every county in Ontario. The ballot offers farmers an opportunity to vote on the representation of marketing questions," Mr. Davidson said.

Council and on the form of membership and financing for the new organization," he said.

At a press conference following the meeting Mr. Davidson emphasized that after the vote farmers will influence the structure and financing of the new organization.

"Farmers must elect delegates to the founding convention and members of the Provincial Council, the governing body of the GFO.

"Farmers will elect all the members of the Provincial Council. No Minister of the Crown will sit on the Provincial Council as is the case under the Medical and Dentistry Acts and under the Law Society Act.

"The Founding Convention and subsequent annual meetings of the GFO must ratify, modify or reject bylaws made by the Provincial Council.

"The legislation provides for the holding of annual and special conventions and for the election of delegates to these meetings. Bill 140 specifies that the Provincial Council must make a full report to annual meetings, including a certified financial statement. The legislation even provides for dissolution of the organization at the request of producers.

"When we recognize that three delegates will be elected for every 1,000 farmers or a major part thereof, we can realize that the GFO will be more representative of individual farmers than any organization we have had to date.

"Our county committeemen and canvassers have been thoroughly briefed on the legislation.

4. To work with local, provincial and national health organizations to co-ordinate health services;

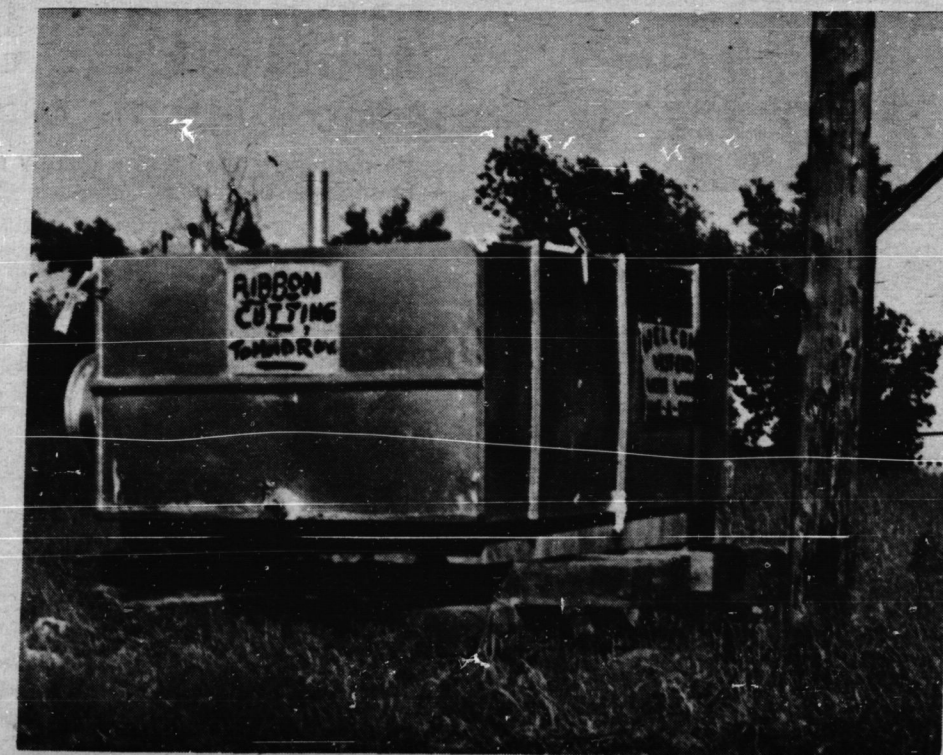
5. To encourage and assist in the planning of community health facilities and services.
