Twp. To Burn Garbage Despite Violating Act

JARVIS — Walpole Township will continue open burning of garbage at its Concession Six dump even though it violates the Air Pollution Control Act.

Joseph Lyng, district inspector for the pollution control department attended last week's meeting of the township council to discuss alternative methods of disposal.

But councillors maintained that there is no problem in Walpole. "Burning keeps the vermin down," township clerk David Wilson said, "and if we don't burn paper the people will do it in their backyards."

"A mile away from any houses its not hurting anybody," said Reeve Hugh Greenfield.

Mr. Lyng conceded that Walpole's dump is well maintained and he has received no complaints, but said that within the next few years the township might consider switching to a land-fill operation or a pit incinerator.

Land-fill involves trenching, filling with garbage and then covering over. A pit incinerator uses air blowers and creates no smoke, he said.

"Every time we look up, a government inspector tells us to do something else," Mr. Greenfield said, "but who is going to pay for it?"

"If we don't burn the paper off the garbage our six acres will last us three years," he said.

Mr. Lyng said he would not demand an immediate halt to the open burning but would send the council information on other methods they might consider.

To Compete In Roadco

The Cayuga Detachment investigated a total of 7 accidents during the period of June 1-7, 1969. Of these 7 accidents, 2 were personal injury causing injuries to 2 persons.

Officers patrolled a total of 5,629 miles during the period and issued 26 warnings and 32 charges to motorists for infractions of the Highway Traffic Act and its Regulations. Three persons were charged with Impaired Driving. As a result of 4 Liquor Control Act Investigations, 4 persons have been charged. In Provincial Judges Court on June 5th, 29 convictions were registered for this Detachment. 3 Break and Enters, 1 Assault, and 14 requests for assistance.

Safe Boating Week Nanticoke

The number of pleasure boats in Canada has passed the million mark, resulting in growing traffic congestion - the condition so prevalent on highways - on lakes, rivers and coastal waters.

The sharp increase in pleasure boating has generated the need for a much greater emphasis on safer boating practices. The Canada Safety Council in co-operating with the Department of Transport is sponsoring and promoting a new campaign this year to help fill this need.

Safe Boating Week, from June 29-July 5, which is fully endorsed by Canada's major associations and organizations concerned with boating, stresses boating hazards, accident prevention methods and safety regulations.

More than 300 Canadians are killed in boating accidents every year, substantially more than are drowned while swimming.

Statistics gathered by the Council and other safety organizations show that two-thirds of these fatalities are caused by faulty boat operation and fully one-half by recklessness, overloading and sailing unseaworthy craft.

Defences against boating hazards are not difficult to learn and small boat safety regulations are clear and to
