On The Farm Front

The obvious problem for many farmers throughout Ontario this year is what change in cropping plans should be made because of the very late spring seeding. Arranging the considerations

1) There is a possibility that soybeans would still be a satisfactory crop provided that weeds are not a problem in the field or fields available. 2) With the corn crop seeded at this date, plant population could be reduced to help with maturity. The objective for late plantings might be 18,000 plants per acre.

3) It may be too late for seeding new stands of hay or pasture because of the possibility of hot, dry weather before too long.

4) Spraying for weed control will become more critical since it could conflict with the spraying should not be overlooked. Perhaps it will be possible to arrange for spraying in the morning and haying in the afternoon.

5) Obviously, earlier varieties of corn will be planted where possible.
