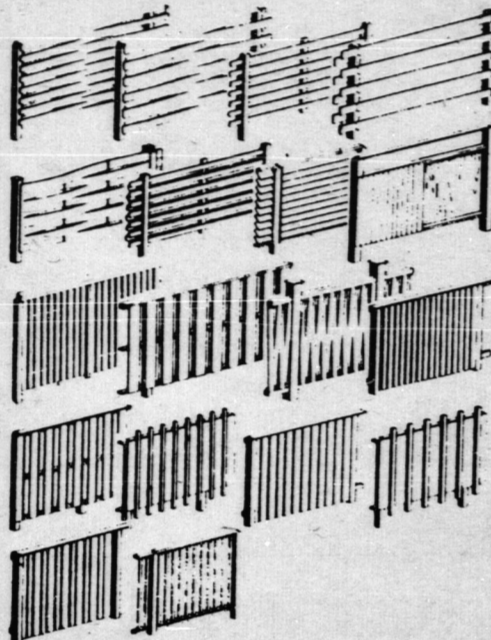

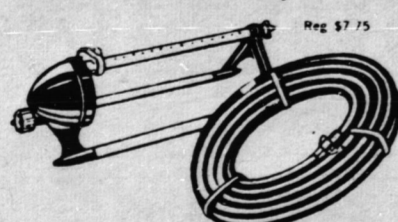

## Merchants Finish Fourth

The Jarvis Merchants finished fourth in the O.A.S.A. Senior "A" Fastball Tournament held in Oshawa over the weekend.

They ended with a 2-2 won-lost record in the tournament that featured the 13 best Senior "A" teams in Ontario as well as the local Merchants, last year's Intermediate "A" Champions.

The three-day event began on Friday evening and the last of 21 games was scheduled for 4:00 p.m. Sunday afternoon. At that time Oshawa Tonys and Windsor Drop-In Tavern were the only teams left in contention for the championship.

Rain intervened, however, and the final game had to be postponed until next Saturday. The winner of this game earns the right to represent Ontario in the Canadian Summer Games to be held in Halifax later this summer. The loser will represent Ontario in the Canadian Championships to be held in Saskatoon in August.

In the first game on Saturday the Merchants dropped a thrilling 2-1 decision to last year's Canadian Champions, St. Catherine's T.F.'s.

Johnny Edwards and Jimmy Moore battled pitch-for-pitch through six scoreless innings before Gord Fearman of Jarvis broke the deadlock.

He led off the top of the seventh with a triple that bounced over the fence. It missed being a home by inches.

At this point Wally Dick relieved Moore and Ted Phibbs jumped on his first pitch for a base hit, scoring Fearman and giving Jarvis a 1-0 lead.

In the bottom of the inning Hiebert was safe on the only Jarvis error of the game. After Hodgkins struck out McDougall tripled to tie the score at 1-1. Shepherd then fled to shallow centre leaving a runner on third with two out. With a two-strike count, Bob Cort laid down a perfect bunt and the winning run crossed the plate. Jarvis outthit St. Catherine's 7-3 in the seven-inning game.

As a result of the loss Jarvis entered the losers round of the double knockout, elimination tournament.

At 3 o'clock they met Toronto 7-Up Shopsy's and John Edwards threw a 3-hit as the Merchants won 2-0.

Jarvis scored both their runs in the first inning. Joe Clark singled to start the game. After Bill Prince struck out, Harry Reekie was safe on an error and they both scored on a double by Hub Fehrman.

Jarvis outthit Shopsy's 5-3 in the fast, well-played game. The next game for the Merchants was at 7:30 when they squeezed by Newmarket by the score of 3-2.

Newmarket opened the scoring in the top of the second on singles by Gould and Skelchir, sandwiched around a passed ball.

Fred McKeen got that one back in the bottom of the inning when he blasted one over the left field fence.

The Merchants went ahead 2-1 in the third when Dennis Craddock singled, moved to second on a sacrifice bunt by Laird More, and scored on a base hit by Joe Clark.

Newmarket tied it up in the fifth on a base hit by Morrison, a sacrifice by McKnight and a single by MacNeil.

Jarvis pulled the game out of the fire in the bottom of the seventh on a single by John Edwards and a sacrifice by McKeen. With two out, Harry Reekie hit a pinch single to score Edwards from third.

This win put Jarvis into the semi-finals at 12 o'clock on Sunday against Windsor Drop-In Tavern.

Windsor scored both their runs in the third on only one hit. Bob Frazer was hit by a pitch and when Earl Smith

tried a sacrifice bunt, two Jarvis throwing errors allowed many of the same teams in one run to score and left the one at Oshawa as well as another runner on third. A Dundas Merchants and base hit by Ray Lessard then plated the insurance run.

Once again Jarvis outthit their opponents, this time by a 5-2 margin, but couldn't put them together.

John Edwards, the work-horse of the Jarvis club, went the first six innings of the game and deserved better fate. He was relieved by Hub Fehrman who allowed no hits in the seventh inning.

Following this game Windsor belted Dick Hames for nine hits enroute to a 4-1 victory over London TV Cable.

Other teams in the Tournament included Windsor Emery Homes, Galt, Welland, Niagara Falls, Richmond Hill, Knob Hill, Sault Ste. Marie.

Last night the Merchants travelled to Hamilton to meet Pyetts of the Big Four in an interlocking contest and Saturday night they will play host to Mt. Hope at 8:30 p.m.

Jarvis has entered the Welland Rose Festival Tournament that begins on Monday, June 23 and runs through Monday, June 30.
