TORONTO, June 9 and June 10th, was the day when the Anglican Women's Training College and Covenant College of The United Church of Canada become one. Symbolically, it is also the anniversary of Church Union for the United Church. Forty-four years ago the union of the Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational Churches was consummated in the Mutual Street Arena here.

The Anglican Women's Training College will leave the premises at 217 St. George Street it has occupied since 1947 and move its furniture, office equipment and personnel to the Covenant College building on Charles Street West. (The latter building was opened in January 1955, under the name United Church Training College). Miss Marion G. Niven, who has been principal of the AWTC will become co-principal with Reverend Dr. K. Harriet Christie, Miss Bessie Lane will be dean of residence and lecturers will be Miss Lane, Miss Ruth Pogson and Dr. Douglas Shanks.

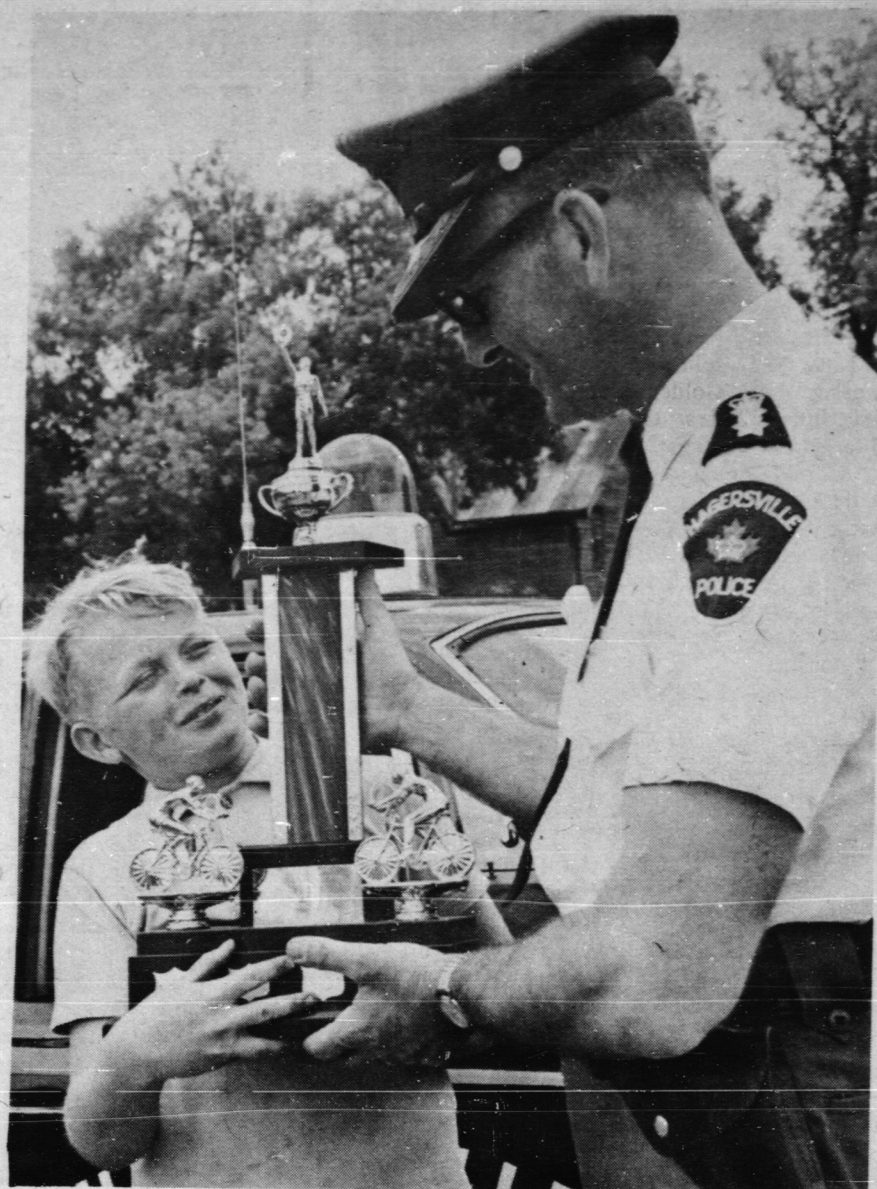
The new college hasn't yet been named but it will be ready with courses and accommodation for 40 students, either men or women, in September.

FO Government Controlled - Miller

Remarking that you can't make a silk purse out of a sow's ear, Walter Miller, president of the Ontario Farmers' Union, June 12th, issued a statement listing 10 reasons why farmers should be against G.F.O. Proposals June 24th.

"First and foremost," he said, "is that G.F.O. would be government controlled farm organization as recommended Chapter 10 of the provincial Government's Farm

some Committee Report, with all the built in insolence that has made farm organizations ineffective in dealing with high corporate complexes." He regarded this as merely the in edge of the wedge for complete take-over of farming in Ontario by the government and agri-business, pointing out that the committee's Report had said (in essence) that 2/3 of farmers would have to go.

Mr. Miller said that the F.U. interpreted the establishment of a G.F.O. as part of a plan, an attempt, to tract teeth from a farm organization, leaving farmers powerless to fight back.

Menu Of The Week

Lima Bean and Sausage Casserole
Waldorf Salad
Caramel Baked Custard
For a hearty meal with a low price tag, combine sausages with a vegetable such as lima beans, suggests the Food Council, Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food.

Baked custard is a good way to add extra protein to any meal. For a family treat, place 1 tbsp of caramel syrup in the bottom of each custard cup before adding the custard mixture.

LIMA BEAN AND SAUSAGE CASSEROLE
6-12 sausages
1 pkg frozen lima beans
2 tbsp butter
2 tbsp flour
2 tbsp chopped onion
1/2 tsp salt
dash pepper
3 medium Ontario hothouse tomatoes, sliced.
1. Simmer sausages in small amount of water for five minutes.
2. Cook beans in salted water until tender. Drain, reserving liquid.
3. Make cream sauce of butter, flour, onion and liquid from beans (add water to make one cup liquid).
4. Add beans to sauce.
5. Pour half of mixture into greased casserole dish.
6. Place tomato slices on bean mixture and cover with remaining bean mixture.
7. Top with sausages.
8. Bake at 350 deg. for 30 minutes.
