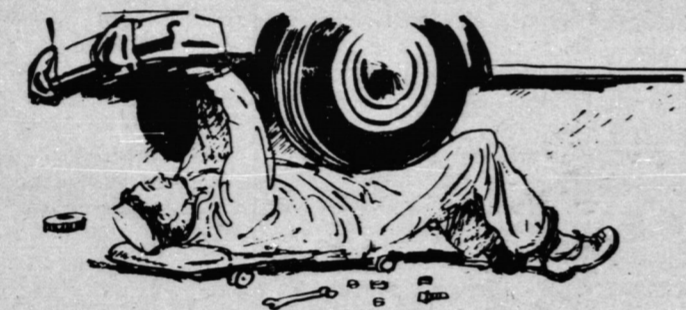
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Editorial Comment

Courtesy Should Be Policy

William Knowles, MP for Norfolk-Haldimand, is justified in carrying to the House of Commons complaints from Port Dover about the Royal Canadian Mounted Police action on American people who came into Port Dover and couldn't report to a custom man because there wasn't one available last Saturday.

The RCMP may have acted in accordance with the law in the case but certainly not from common sense. One of the revenues that is important to that area is the tourist business. This certainly isn't the way to attract tourists.

Revenue Minister Jean-Pierre Cote should certainly look into the situation and make sure that there is a way for visitors to clear customs on the weekend when they come in to Port Dover from across the lake. It would certainly be an improvement on seizing their boats and fining them.

Lack Commercial Areas

A proposed official plan for the municipality of Jarvis does not seem to include enough area for commercial business.

Maybe the planning people should ask themselves where the service businesses will be able to locate when they decide to move into the area.

These type of businesses will want to locate in the area but won't pick Jarvis when the time comes if the overall plan does not include zones for them.

Complaints heard from many real estate people working in the area, who are already looking for places for business to locate, are that there are few areas zoned commercial in the proposed plan except those areas that already have an established commercial business.

Many commercial business people are planning ahead now even to the point of purchasing land so when the time comes to go ahead they can do it with the least amount of difficulty.

Planning people must remember that once an overall plan is approved by the Ontario government it is hard to get changes made in the plan. Public hearings are necessary by the Ontario Municipal Board if there should be any objections to a change. In any case approval is needed from the Board OMB if a change is made.

Wise, Unwise And Otherwise

HUMAN RIGHTS
In 1948 the General Assembly of the United Nations adopted "The Universal Declaration of Human Rights." This is a fairly lengthy document consisting of a Preamble and Thirty Articles. Obviously it is too long to be discussed fully here, but I would like to take the first paragraph of the Preamble and the First Article, for consideration.

These two statements show that the teaching of Jesus Christ, "Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself," and of St. Peter: "Honour all men," is at last penetrating the conscience of the world.

As we look around us today we can see that these ideals are much more honoured in the breach than in the observance. The treatment of black people in Rhodesia and South Africa and, unofficially, in the United States and to a lesser brotherhood," (Article One), degree in Canada is one instance. Another is the words from Jr. Justice James C. McRuer, of Ontario. "I believe in natural justice and moral law as something more than social philosophies and social developments. I believe human rights exist because human beings are human beings with spiritual values. Our task is to give light and air to those spiritual values so that they may grow and develop."

Canada could show a truly liberal attitude by sending help to the Palestinian refugees, many of whom are Christians.

A larger percentage of our Boy Scout Troop will be attending the great Jamboree at Ottawa this summer than for any other Troop in Ontario and maybe all Canada. Seven of our boys hope to take advantage of this great privilege.
