Don't let yourself be crowded by the driver behind. If someone follows you too closely for safety, encourage him to pass - by pulling off the road if necessary. Signal your intentions - to make a turn, change lanes, or stop suddenly. Signal an intended stop by pumping your brake pedal to flash the brakelights.

Pon't crowd the driver ahead - leave at speed. And remember that high speeds the traffic around you and plan for any and poor weather conditions demand extra foreseeable emergency.
