

### Juniors Stretch Win Streak

The Jarvis Juniors have stretched their winning streak to five games in the Erie Softball League. Over the past two weeks they defeated Fisherville 8-7, Nanticoke, 5-2, Walker doubled in two runs and McGaws 7-2 in three in the top of the eleventh

The next action for the Juniors will be on Friday, July 4 when they take on the Jarvis Harvesters at the local park.

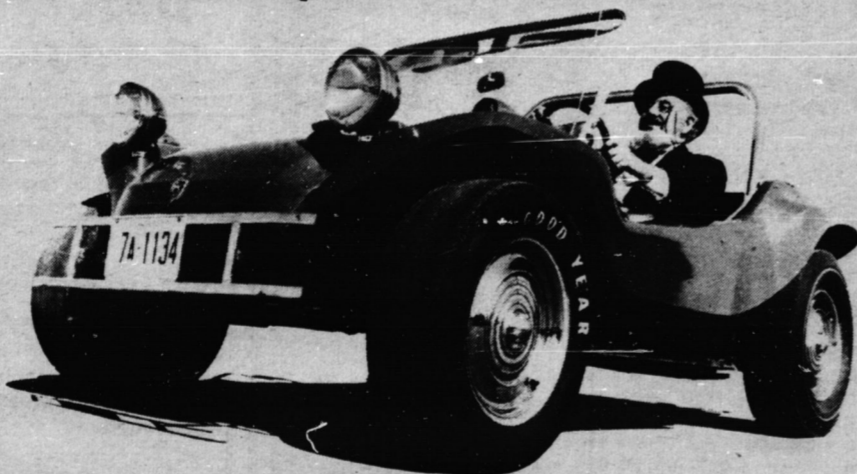

### Three Local Men Ordained As Elders

At Knox Church, Jarvis, on Sun. June 22, 1969, three of the well-known men of the area were inducted into the eldership of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and the local Session (a court of the church). All three men have been noted for service over and beyond the call of duty in church, community, lodge, service club and local sports efforts.

Ernest Andrew Craddock was born in Onieda, July 28, 1923. He grew up and attended schools in Walpole and Jarvis and was baptized and confirmed in the Gore Church in the years before church union. Through the years Mr. Craddock has served in his church both as a teacher in the school and as a sabbath school superintendent and member of Knox Cemetery Board of Directors. In his lodge activities, Mr. Craddock is a past noble grand (IOOF) and a senior deacon (Masonic). In his veterans activities, Mr. Craddock is a member of the Hagersville Legion and of the Ontario Armoured Corps. In his municipal service he was a councillor for one year. He has been Reeve of Jarvis during the past nine years and will be remembered in Jarvis history for many admirable reasons: among these, that it was during Reeve Craddock's term of office that the village acquired a municipal water and sewerage system and modernized lighting (street) and broad new pavements on Main and Talbot Streets. Mr. Craddock is rounding out a career in Municipal Government as Warden for 1969 of Haldimand County. Following his stint in the World War II years Ernie went into business with Don Phibbs on Talbot Street in a garage that specializes in friendly welding and repairs (1946). The following year (May 31, 1947) Ernest Craddock married Ruth A. Phibbs, (Don's sister). Ernie and Ruth and their three children (Dennis, Nancy and Susan) would be welcomed as residents in any church and community. Jarvis is grateful to have the Craddock family living here.

Donald Wallace Mitchell, born in Simcoe, December 2, 1930 lived in Townsend Township and attended is schools SS No. 12 Townsend, Jarvis Continuation and the Simcoe High Schools. Confirmed in his membership April 5, 1945, Donald Mitchell has served his Church as Secretary-Treasurer of the Church School (with understand about the old if you are young; there is the wife Marion, Joanne (nee Aitken). 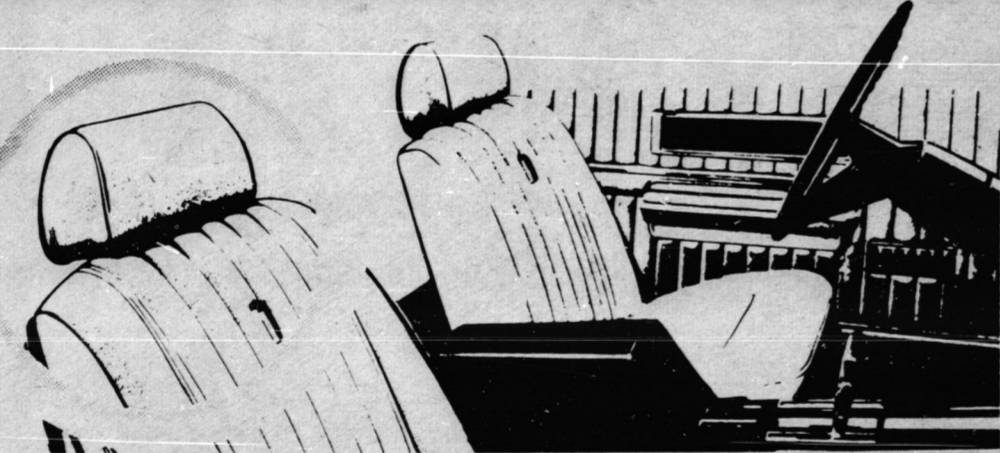

It's good as far as it goes....

The head restraints in 1969 automobiles are designed to reduce injuries due to rear-end collisions. Restraints should help minimize some of the unpleasant effects of these all too common crashes, but their causes can be dealt with only by drivers. There are a number of things you can do to help prevent rear end collisions. Here are some of them.

Don't let yourself be crowded by the driver behind. If someone follows you too closely for safety, encourage him to pass - by pulling off the road if necessary. Signal your intentions - to make a turn, change lanes, or stop suddenly. Signal an intended stop by pumping your brake pedal to flash the brakelights.

Don't crowd the driver ahead - leave at least one car length for each 10 miles of speed. And remember that high speeds and poor weather conditions demand extra

stopping distance. At night, or in rain or fog, allow for reduced visibility or decreased traction.

Limited access highways have made higher speeds common. As a result drivers need to be especially wary of slow-moving or stopped vehicles. Stay alert - be particularly attentive near controlled intersections where vehicles ahead may be slowing, turning, and stopping. Watch for slower-moving merging traffic. Use acceleration and deceleration lanes to change your own speed when entering or leaving a highspeed highway. Prevent secondary collisions at an accident scene by getting off the roadway quickly if you decide to stop.

Be a defensive driver - constantly watch the traffic around you and plan for any foreseeable emergency.
