The commercials on cigarette smoking teach a child to associate smoking with what is pleasant and rich - beautifully furnished rooms, camp fires, lake resorts, luxurious cars, lobbies of theatres, beautiful clothes worn by handsome people. The barrage goes on from morning to night. Even the child of parent who don't smoke is subjected to the barrage day after day. He doesn't know what they mean. As far as adults are concerned the commercials are the tobacco companies' way of keeping their names in competition with others, but as far as children are concerned, make no mistake, they are education to smoke cigarettes. The fact that children are smoking at an earlier age is reason enough for pouring millions into cigarette advertising that reaches children.

**Fire Destroyed Warehouse**

**NELLES CORNERS** - A spectacular fire early last night gutted a two-storey grain storage warehouse causing damage estimated in the thousands.

Lost were hardware tools and tons of fertilizer belonging to Maple Leaf Mills. Fanned by high winds, flames from the building sent sparks hundreds of feet into the air threatening a seed mill, gasoline station and horse stable.

About 70 volunteer fire-fighters from four departments - Hagersville, Selkirk, Fisherville and Kohler - braved the blaze under control about 8 p.m., 90 minutes after it was discovered by two Maple Leaf night shift employees.

Firefighters were concerned about two tons of explosive ammonium nitrate fertilizer stored in a corner of the warehouse, but constant dousing prevented an explosion.

"I would say the boys did a lovely job," said Bill McClarty, chief of the Hagersville and district fire department. "After all, it was an old building."

Office space and show room facilities of Maple Leaf Mills received smoke and injuries.

**Stelco's Capacity May Double**

By the year 1980, Canada's population is expected to exceed 25,000,000, with standards of living and trend towards higher steel consumption per capita, Canadian steel production this period could grow to twice the 1968 output of approximately 11,000,000 tons. Accordingly, with the intention of retaining its current share of the market, Stelco must plan to double its own production capacity in the next 12 years.

This need for growth in a rapidly changing and highly competitive environment is the basis for the Company's long range plans. The planning embraces carefully prepared forecasts of the expected increase in demand for steel products and the competitive conditions which are likely to be encountered.

Also, intensive technical and engineering studies are made to ensure that the design and location of new facilities, and the timing of their construction, will be properly coordinated with market needs to serve the long-term interests of the Company and its shareholders.

The acquisition in 1968 of 6,600 acres of property on Lake Erie in the area of Nanticoke, Ontario, was the initial step in the creation of a major new plant to meet future needs. The first facilities at this site are being designed and will be installed in the next few years. The feasibility of developing an appropriate part of the acreage for use as an industrial park is also being studied.

**SIMCOE** - Extensive property damage resulted when a car ran into a ditch on the Bell Mill Road, about three miles south of Tillsonburg.

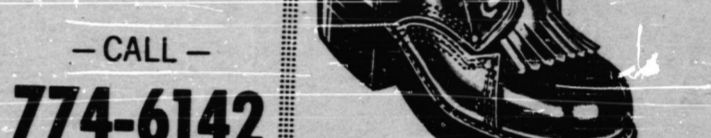
