PROVINCIAL Judge Norman R. H. Young has signed after nine years as magistrate in Haldimand County. It will be epochal if even that fortunate county, blessed with a succession of just and humane jurists, finds a replacement of Judge Young's character and

He is a rare breed of man. He fulfilled the finest and fullest traditions of jurisprudence. He did not

merely dispense justice; he put it to work.

Judge Young's decisions on the bench manifested Haldimand's social consciousness.

He stoutly defended the county against mayhem committed by homegrown rowdies and against incursions by visiting hoodlums. He dealt severely and fairly with people whose wanton or irresponsible d the lives and property of others He actively and successfully campaigned against

vandalism, teen-age drinking and liquor-automobile offences. The court pledged that those violations wouldn't be tolerated and backed its promise with stiff

No innocent man had cause to fear conviction in Haldimand police court. Judge Young left no fact unturned. Often we heard him productively purse a line of questioning overlooked by a lawyer.

He was not impressed with soft soap of half-hearted promises. No culprit of proven guilt could expect undeserved leniency on the strength of a lawyer's flowery rationalizations.

A final mark of the man's sense of justice and ntegrity: He has openly lambasted the provincial attorney-general's department for failing to pay a court official's salary for duties performed over the last 16
