and hourly-rated employees before a provincial councillor fell through in Simcoe.

A spokesman for Local 2342 of the International Woodworkers of America, which bargains for 200 employees at the plant, said the side reached a stalemate on the union's major request for check-off of dues.

No further issues were discussed in the meeting which lasted just slightly over two hours. The union spokesman said the conciliation officer told the sides it was no use proceeding further if they could not

reach an agreement. If a conciliation board is appointed and fails to reach an agreement the union can legally strike seven days after the board's report is released by the minister.

The employees at the plant on Third Line, Oneida township, have been without a contract since Jan. 21, when their one-year agreement expired. Seven meetings have failed to produce an agreement.

The issue has now been referred to the Ontario department of labor in Toronto.

What happens now depends on the conciliation officer's report to Labor Minister Dalton Bales and the minister's subsequent report. If Mr. Bales recommends "no board" in the dispute the union can legally strike 14 days after his report is released.

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Girl Guides

"Operation Out-Look", a

project of the Girl Guides of

Canada, will take 13 young

women from across Canada

to the Northwest Territories

and Newfoundland this

summer. Chosen as

outstanding representatives of

the Guide association, the

girls, aged 16 to 20, will form

two training teams to share

their recreational and cultural

skills with young people at

opposite ends of the

country.

Seven young women from

eastern Canada will lead two

week-long training camps for

young adults at Prelude Lake,

22 miles from Yellowknife,

July 2 to 16. They will help

trainees plan camp

programmes, menus, buying

of supplies, teach health and

safety rules and share cultural

skills such as folk-singing,

dancing, crafts, puppetry,

nature and games. Trainees

who will come from all over

the Territories, will learn how

to organize youth activities in

their own communities on

their return. Their visiting

leaders also hope to learn

from them.

Guides in charge is Dr.

Mary Habgood of Inuvik

N.W.T. and her assistant is

Mrs. A.E.L. Hayden,

Whitehorse, Y.T. Miss Patricia

McIntosh of the Niagara Area

will be part of this project

team.

Six girls from Western

Canada will travel by boat to

such Newfoundland outposts

as Port Aux Basques, Burgeo,

Ramea, St. Alban's, Harbour

Breton and Terranceville, and

by car and bus to Grand

Falls, St. John's and

Cornerbrook. They will be

billeted in local schoolhouses

and will bring their crafts,

congs and leadership skills to

people of all ages.

The offering was dedicated

by singing a hymn. Final

arrangements were made for

the C.G.I.T. banquet and a

committee formed to plan a

June wedding. The Mizpah

benediction closed the

meeting after which a dainty

lunch was served by the

committee and social hour

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Guides-in-charge in Phyllis

from Newfoundland and her

assistant is Marjorie Pike of

St. John's Newfoundland.

"Operation Out-Look" has

been planned for more than a

year, and the girls are being

thoroughly briefed by

monthly letters from leaders.

Also being circulated are

training kits containing

records, tapes, slides, books,

craft assignments and

scrapbooks to familiarize the

girls with their respective

areas. Teams will meet in

Toronto on route to both

projects for a complete

briefing and later for

evaluation sessions.

The operation was

conceived by the areas

concerned as a service

adventure and an opportunity

for young adults to assist the

youth of their own country.

It is financed through the

Oster Trust Fund, a fund set

up to honour a former Chief

Commissioner of the Girl

Guides of Canada, Miss E.

Henrietta of Toronto.
