Provincial Police Report

The week of April 27th to May 3rd, the Cayuga Detachment investigated a total of 7 accidents, 2 were personal injury and caused injuries to 3 persons. Officers patrolled a total of 6,635 miles and issued 30 warnings and 35 charges to motorists for infractions of the Highway Traffic Act and the Regulations.

General occurrences investigated increased over the previous week. Officers investigated 4 break-ins, 3 thefts and answered 21 requests for assistance. A stolen auto from Oneida Township was recovered by the Cayuga Detachment.

Iron deficiency can result in a tired feeling, paleness, and more seriously, a loss of appetite leading to other health disorders.

Introduces General Farm Organization Legislation

The Honourable Wm. A. Stewart, Ontario's Minister of Agriculture and Food, introduced legislation providing for the establishment of a General Farm Organization in Ontario.

Bill 140 provides for an opinion poll of farmers on the question of the establishment of a General Farm Organization as outlined in the Bill and some basic alternatives on methods of financing the organization. This opinion poll will be conducted following receipt of a petition bearing the names of 15,000 Ontario farmers, and upon approval of the Bill by the Ontario Legislature and its receiving Royal Assent.

Firecrackers Lethal Weapons

Firecrackers in the hands of children are lethal weapons. It would appear that some merchants in the two-county area are not aware of this. Surely legislation isn't needed for certain merchants to realize their moral obligations to their community and to themselves.

Firecrackers can put out an eye of a playmate of a child who is playing a game of throwing them. A firecracker could be the cause of a fire that could destroy thousands of dollars worth of property.

The same fire could be in a home or an apartment building and could cost the lives of innocent people. Surely it isn't necessary for each municipality to legislate against the sale of firecrackers to children because some person thinks that if he doesn't sell them to children somebody else will.

Firecrackers in a properly supervised display attended by adults are attractive and exciting.

Each merchant who stocks firecrackers for sale should take it upon himself to decide to whom he will sell them. He should take it upon himself to refuse any sale to a child.

Matches are also dangerous and shouldn't be in the hands of children. They also should not be sold to youngsters.

De Gaulle The Strong Man

Gen. De Gaulle never seemed to be out of the news for very long, no matter what he did or didn't do, and now that he is no longer president of France, he is still not out of the news. In fact, column after column has been written as to what he did for France and what he failed to do. Forgotten in all the discussion of De Gaulle's policies are the people of France, the ones who supported him for so long and then decided that it was time to turn their back on him. What was there in De Gaulle that appealed to Frenchmen and what was their life like under him?

First of all, many Frenchmen may be romantic but they are also romanticists and one thing that De Gaulle did that appealed to many people was to try to restore the old glories of France. The French, like the Spanish and the Portuguese can read in their history books of their glorious past - a past when their nation played a far greater role in world affairs than it does now. If someone can come along and promise the people a touch of those glorious days, then there are many who are going to follow such a person.

This is exactly what De Gaulle did. He wanted to make France the leading power in Western Europe, to give the country such prestige that all roads would lead to Paris. This is what many Frenchmen saw - a vision of France at the centre of Western Europe, and, in fact, of the whole Frenchspeaking world, and it recalled to a certain extent the brilliant years of Louis XIV, the sun king.

At the same time as France was trying to find its place in the sun, the people were also afflicted by something familiar to many Canadians - inflation. Partly as a result of inefficient government measures the wage earner in France was getting less and less for, and while salaries did not keep up with the rise in prices, the French had to look with envy at the relative prosperity of their neighbours, the Germans, who seemed to have everything coming their way. If the Germans could do it, why not the French, and so, along with the envy came a touch of frustration - a touch which developed into something bigger as time went by.

As well as being romanticists the French also have an independent streak in them, and while many hoped that De Gaulle would be able to lead the nation to new heights, an increasing number resented the impression he gave that he was indispensable to the country. To a certain extent he was, in that there were not very many suitable alternatives to him, but he was also mortal, and many Frenchmen started to realize that sooner or later they were going to have to do without him, so why not now.

After all, they were getting a little tired of being told that he alone was good for them. Most Frenchmen like to think that they alone know best what they should do - a characteristic that seems to be prevalent in many parts of the world, by the way.

Wise, Unwise And Otherwise

In a recent article I pointed out that the great hero, King Arthur, was actually the leader of the Romanised Britons against the invading Norsemen. The first historian to mention him was Nennius who wrote around 800 A.D. How then did he come to occupy such a position in folk lore? It was Sir Thos. Malory who invented most of the legend about Arthur and his book was printed by William Caxton, the first English printer, in 1485. But, first, let us remind ourselves of the main outline of the Arthurian Legend. This states that Arthur was found by the wizard Merlin as a tiny babe on the lakeshore and brought up by King Uther Pendragon. When the King died Arthur became king because he alone could draw out a sword that was embedded in solid rock. As king he formed the famous Round Table of knights in armour who went all over the place rescuing maidens in distress and doing other knightly deeds. At his death he was carried by three queens to his last resting place - Avalon, now called Glastonbury. Malory describes an ideal king and court of the Middle Ages, nearly a thousand years after Arthur died. His description of Arthur and his Knights inspired Tennyson to write his beautiful "Idylls of the King" and the deeply moving "Morte d'Arthur."
