A number from this community attended the play "Brigadoon" held at the Port Dover High School the past weekend.

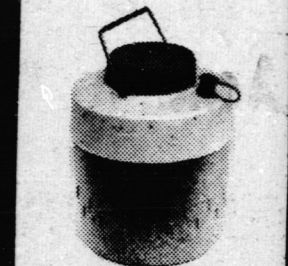
The Mt. Zion U.C.W. catered to the bowling banquet held in the Jr. Farmer's Building in Simcoe, on Saturday, night.

OPP Report

The Cayuga Detachment reports that during the week of April 20-26, 1969, a total of 7 accidents were investigated, — of these 7 accidents, 1 caused injuries to 1 person. This was a decrease of 5 over the previous week.

Officers patrolled a total of 6,725 miles, issuing 31 warnings and 30 charges to motorists for infractions of the Highway Traffic Act. As a result of 2 Liquor Control Act investigations, 3 persons have been charged. One driver has been charged with No Insurance. In Provincial Judge's Court on Thursday, April 24th, 49 convictions were registered for this Detachment.

General occurrences investigated during the past week were 4 thefts, 1 break in and officers answered 16 requests for assistance. During the past week, 2 children were bitten by dogs. Owners of dogs are reminded that the Vicious Dogs Act states that when a person has been bitten by a dog, the owner may be summoned to appear before a Provincial Judge to show cause why the dog should not be destroyed.

The 1968 Vehicle Accident Statistics for Ontario have been released and they show that 214 children in the age group 0-14 years were fatally injured. Of these, 40 were riding bicycles.

This should be an indication to parents to stress to their children that riding a bicycle on to-day's highways and streets demands all of the knowledge of the rules and regulations.
