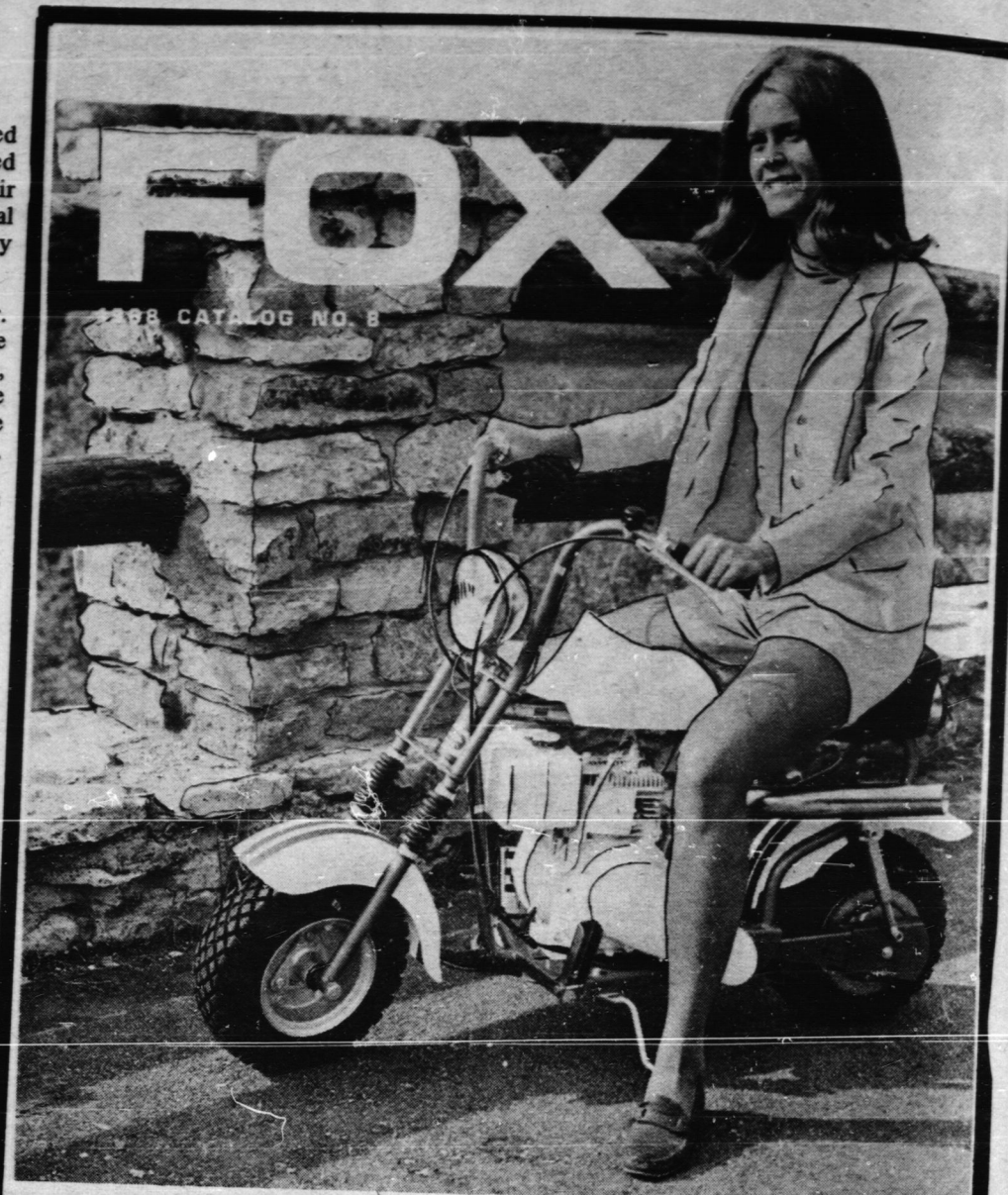

Dollars and Good Sense

On the infrequent (thank goodness) occasions I have had to do the family grocery shopping, my wife has always accused me on my return of other items at various stores. That is, I stick strictly to a prepared list.
