### To Open New Park

DUNNVILLE - Rock Point Provincial Park will be open this season.

Two local councils and the Niagara Regional Development Council feared the park would be closed because of poor attendance last season.

Peter Addison, chief of the department's parks branch, said the decision on whether or not to close the park was "touch-and-go." The department decided to leave it open.

He said last year might have been a bad season because of bad weather at the start of the season. But the department does not feel there is a need for Rock Point since Selkirk Provincial Park a few miles away is now open. The 187-acre Rock Point Park has only 47 camp sites while Selkirk at 128 acres, has 100 campsites.

The department thought there was a need for a second park in the area and opened Selkirk last year, Mr. Addison said. "We found there was not the need we had expected."

Despite the pending closure, improvements to the park, including a gravelled road and renovated washroom facilities, were carried out during the winter.

Mr. Addison said the improvements were made before the department contemplated closing the park.

The park will stay open all summer, he said. Plans for the park in 1970 will depend on the attendance this summer.

### Menu Of The Week

Home economists at MacDonald Institute, University of Guelph, suggest braised steak for a meal that's filling, tasty, easy to prepare and trouble-free to cook.

FOIL-WRAPPED STEAK DINNER

1½ pounds steak, round or flank  
1 envelope onion soup mix  
Place the meat on foil and sprinkle it with the onion soup mix. Put in quartered carrots and potatoes cut in sticks.

Dot the vegetables with butter and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Fold the foil over and bake at 325°F. for 1½ hours or until the meat is tender.

Residential rates for public school supporters went from 107 mills last year - up 12 mills; separate school residential from 107 mills - up 24.11 mills. Public school ratepayers will pay an additional \$12 a thousand and separate school \$24 a thousand.

The ratepayers will be required to raise \$404,424 - less the Ontario property reduction tax which hasn't been announced as yet this year.

Clerk Mid Long, of Port Dover, said the raise in the levy was because of capital expenditures and salary raises.

"The public school rates are about the same as last year but the separate school levy has taken a big jump."

"This is because of the large increase in the education levy made by the Haldimand-Norfolk Roman Catholic Separate School Board," he said.
