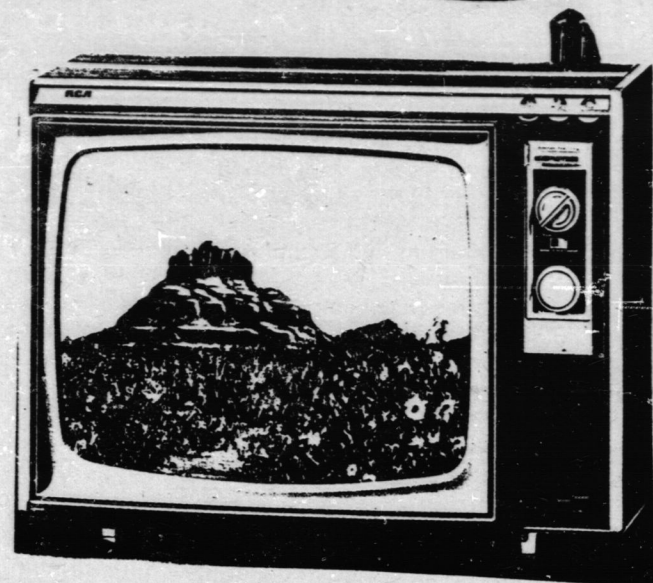

Danger Ahead

April to October is a
hazardous time of year, on
and off the farm. Studies
show that 93 percent of farm
accidents were preventable.
Carelessness is the chief cause
we suspect, and quoting all
kinds of statistics won't
prevent accidents. You and
your families and me and my
family are the people who
can prevent accidents.

Here are some reminders!
Tractor operation - did
you know that when steering
a tractor into a tight turn,
tipping danger at 6 miles an
hour is 4 times greater than at
3 miles an hour? So speed is an
important safety factor.

Fatigue causes
carelessness, which causes
accidents. What do you prove
when you spend hours on end
on your tractor, if you wind
up under it because you got
too tired to be careful. Take a
break from long continuous
hours at one job - have a
coffee, or get someone to
spell you off for a while.
Watch the critical hours of 10
a.m. - 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. - 4
p.m. when most tractor
accidents occur.

Hurry produces accidents! Store spray materials
Take time to put safety under lock and key in a

shafts. Let your tractor cool equipment shed. When bags

We've been talking about
machinery accidents, but
there is another important
kind in the summer. These
are accidents resulting from
careless handling of
herbicides and pesticides.
Most of these materials are
poisons. Read the label
carefully. When handling
chemicals wear protective
clothing including a face
mask if specified on the label.
Don't breathe spray fumes
and keep spray materials
from all contact with the
skin. If some gets on you,
wash thoroughly with soap
and water.

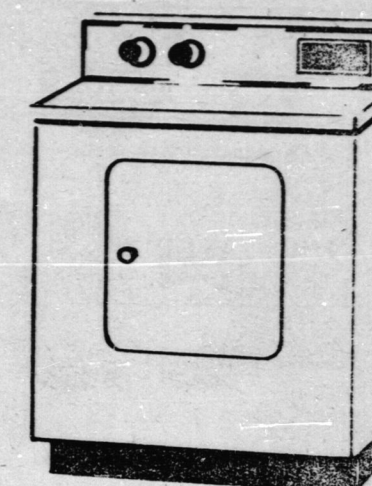
