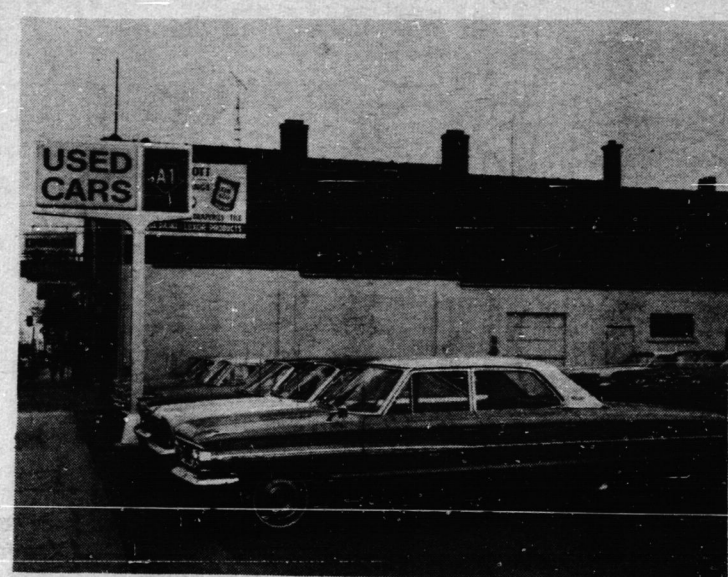

Wants Caledonia In Area

A brief by the city of Hamilton to include Caledonia in a Hamilton-Burlington-Wentworth region was flatly rejected by Haldimand County Council.

The city proposed to include portions of Seneca and Oneida as well as the town of Caledonia.

The county council gave four main reasons for denying the proposal:

Haldimand is essentially rural and is not required even for the long term development needs of the Hamilton area.

The proposal would remove a significant percentage of Haldimand's population and assessment adversely affecting the county and the Haldimand-Norfolk region.

From a planning standpoint it would prejudice the Haldimand-Norfolk study and finalize planning on the basis of inadequate data.

The proposal is inconsistent with provincial principles for establishing regional government.

Council's brief says Haldimand's utility systems are dependent upon the Grand River and are unlikely to be linked to the metro Hamilton system. It said that the assessment and population were removed, the Haldimand-Norfolk region would have limited resources relative to regions proposed or established by the province.

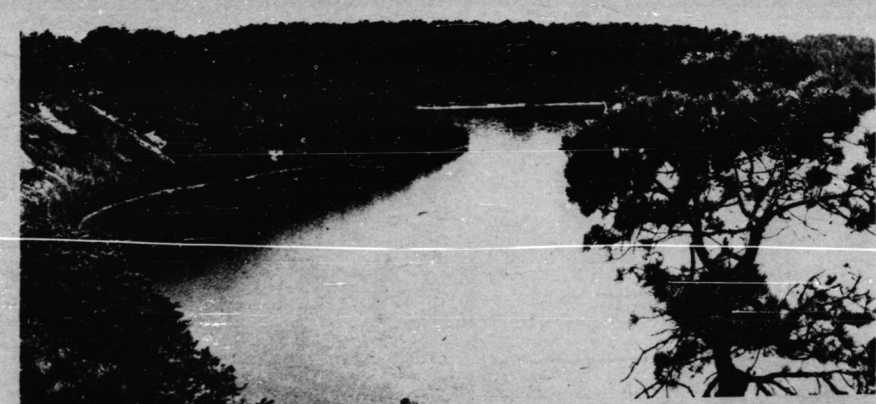

India Comes To Haldimand

At Sangam, one of the four world guiding centres, in Poona, India, two leaders of the Girl Guides of Canada represented Canada for the first international friendship session held last December and January. 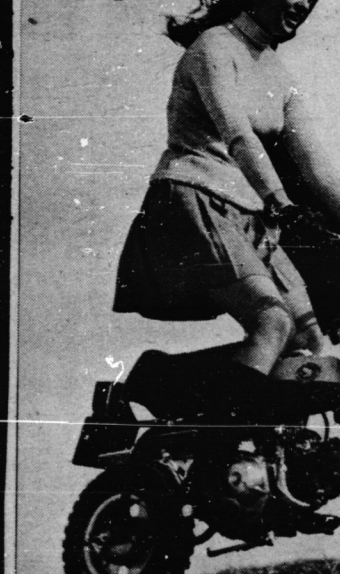
