Jarvis Merchants Split Games

The Jarvis Merchants came out of their first two 1969 Tri-County Senior Fastball League games with a one and one record.

On Thursday night at Binbrook the Merchants came out on the short end of a 5-2 decision but bounced back here on Saturday night to wallop Mt. Hope by the score of 12-5.

In the opening game the Merchants came out like tigers as Joe Clark walked and Hub Fehrman followed with a triple to give them a 1-0 lead in the first half inning. The lead was short-lived, however, as the Star Cleaners tied the game in their half of the inning and went ahead 2-1 in the third frame.

They added two more in the fourth inning and a singleton in the eighth to wrap up the victory. Jarvis got their second run in the eighth when they loaded the bases with one out. They had an excellent opportunity to get back in the game but could push only one run across.

Carl Wood started for Binbrook and was credited with the victory. He was relieved in the eighth inning by Pete Parker who contained the Merchants the rest of the way.

Imperial Sales Up

Unaudited consolidated results of Imperial Tobacco Company of Canada Limited for the three months ended March 31, showed sales at \$104,321,000, an increase of \$9,418,000 over the same period of 1968.

The results of both years include Growers' Wine Company Limited for the first time and 1969 results include S & W Fine Foods, Inc., San Francisco, which was purchased at the beginning of this year.

Imperial Tobacco expects that earnings for fiscal 1969 will show some improvement over 1968 on a comparable re-stated basis. The company announced price increases on its products in late March and the benefits will be reflected in the final three quarters of the year.

Consolidated net earnings for the quarter at \$2,306,000, or 23 cents per share were below the 1968

New Seed Grain Varieties

The 1969 edition of Publication 296, Field Crop Recommendations includes a number of changes in varietal recommendations. Briefly these include:

Spring Grains

Barley (Spring):

Fergus has been added to the recommended list of barley varieties and is recommended for all areas of Ontario. It has been designated as a variety for feed or malting purposes. Seed supplies will be limited for planting in 1969.

It is noted that York and Parkland may be removed from the recommended list in 1970.

The recommendation for Champlain has been changed to include all areas of Ontario where mildew and lodging are not problems. Formerly it was recommended only for parts of Eastern Ontario.

Although having a high yield potential, Champlain is quite susceptible to disease and lodging.

In publication 296, the recommendation for Keystone should read "Recommended for all areas where mildew is not a problem. Its lodging characteristics are no worse than York or Herta."

Oats: There are no changes in oat variety recommendations for 1969. It should be noted, however, that Russell may be removed from recommendation in 1970.

There are no changes in the recommendations for spring wheat and flax.

Winter Grains

Winter Wheat:

The Yorkstar variety has been recommended for all areas south of the 2300 heat-unit line in Ontario.

Yorkstar has shown in regional trials superior yield performance and excellent milling qualities. It is noted in the description of the varieties that Yorkstar has a medium to low bushel weight relative to the other varieties recommended.

Recommendations for other winter cereals remain the same as in 1968.

Forage Crops

Alfalfa:

Irroquois alfalfa has been added to the recommended list in 1969. This variety developed at Cornell is winter hardy, wilt resistant and generally has excellent persistence. Seed supplies are somewhat limited.

Birdfoot Trefoil: Leo has been recommended for use in Ontario in 1969. This variety is described as having better seedling vigor than Empire, excellent winter hardiness, and a fair tolerance to inadequate drainage. It is intermediate in maturity relative to Viking and Empire. Seed will be in short supply in 1969.

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Prospects in Varieties

Spring Barley:

Brock is a new feed barley type developed at O.A.C. It is hoped that the variety will be licensed shortly. If so, seed of the variety will be released to seed growers this spring for seed increase. The variety, it is expected, will replace York as a recommended variety in 1970. It was developed from a series of backcrosses to York. Brock has resistance to loose smut and mildew. Its straw strength is similar to York. Dr. Reinbergs has isolated three types or variations of plants in his foundation lines. Tests with the three types indicate superior performance from a mixture of the three types. The breeders seed, to be released, will include the three types. The differences between the types are not large and should not cause seed growers any problems.

Paragon which was released in 1968 in Western Canada is similar to Conquest but has shorter straw and a slightly higher yield. Results of early malting tests look good. Paragon is susceptible to mildew. If Paragon continues to show good performance in 1969 in Ontario it will be recommended in 1970 to replace Parkland.
