Welcome Wagon For Citizens

It would seem that it could be the responsibility of church groups and service clubs to see these people are welcomed and told what is available here for them.

Many communities have a welcoming committee called the welcome wagon that provides just such a service. The welcoming committee could consist of appointees from the various churches and service club groups.

The merchants could also get in a few licks by putting their names before these people. Possibly they could even provide a few welcoming gifts.

Zoning Plans Are Precarious

Jarvis is on the threshold of a new era. The town fathers have prepared a proposed plan that depicts the orderly growth of the community over the next 20 years.

The plan has been prepared by planning experts, Proctor, Refern, Bousfield and Bacon of Toronto. One person's definition of an expert is a stranger from out of town.

The factor that may not be showing in the plan is the knowledge of the local people about their own municipality. The village council should take a long hard look at the plan to make sure it contains all the necessary zoned areas for an orderly but common sense growth.

When zones have to be changed and a decision has to be made by the Ontario Municipal Board, it can be a long and costly process. Just make sure that all aspects for a boom town are taken care of, which Jarvis no doubt is going to be.

Drugs And Driving Dangerous

Drugs ranging from aspirin and antihistamines to tranquilizers and antibiotics may slow a driver's reaction time and impair his performance behind the wheel.

Dozens of drugs affect the central nervous system in ways that can impair driving ability. Sleeping pills containing barbiturates induce hypnotic effects for up to 14 hours so that the drug taken the night before may be still at work when you drive to the office in the morning.

Mixing drugs is risky. Many people take a tranquilizer in the morning. Then during the course of the day they may gulp down antihistamines for a cold, aspirin, cough syrup and then, after work, a highball or cocktail.

The effect of such combinations is unpredictable and can be especially dangerous for motorists. (Family Safety). For safety: Don't drive if the drugs you are taking cause drowsiness, dizziness, visual disturbances, vertigo and lightheadedness.

These effects can contribute to driving hazards and accidents.
