# An 80-Day Strike

An 80-day strike at Hamilton's Steel Co. of Canada plant ended this week after members of Local 1005, United Steelworkers of America, voted to accept a three-year contract that would raise the average wage to \$4.05 an hour in 1971 from the present \$3.12.

It was a far from unanimous vote with 5,442 favoring and 3,467 against acceptance of the contract which is retroactive to Aug. 1 when the strike began.

The agreement between the union and company is the longest in its history because it hopes to produce an interim report by Christmas and a final one within two years.
