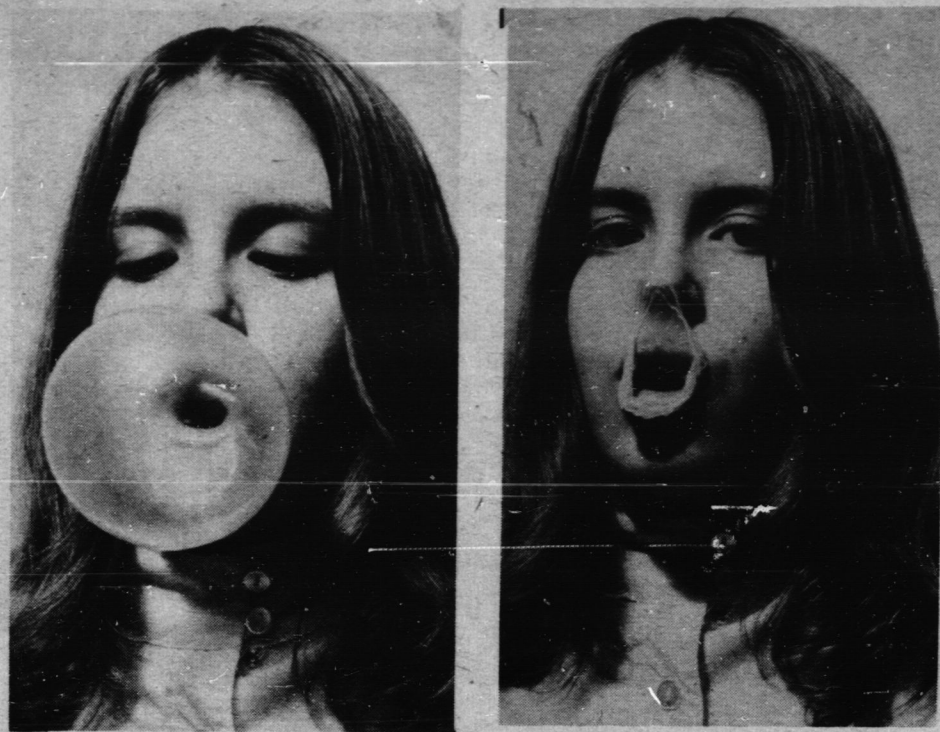

Radar Slows Speeds

HAGERSVILLE — Police records here show a marked decline in the number of tickets issued since a radar unit went into operation.

Chief Raymond Holden, said 36 charges were laid during the month of August, 24 in September and 13 in October.

During the same period of time, eighty-two warnings were given.

"The warnings," the Chief said, "are given to motorists who have exceeded the speed limit by just a few miles an hour."

He said, "safety is our main concern and the radar unit to date has been used mainly in school areas." The chief added, "we also operate the system at night."

All speeding charges, to date, have resulted in convictions. The money received through fines goes directly to the Provincial Government and not to the town as some people seem to think," he said.

Breath Tests Start Dec. 1

OTTAWA — Compulsory breath analysis of drivers suspected of drinking goes into effect Dec. 1 as a step to halt "murder on the highway and carnage on the roads," Justice Minister Turner announced last week.

Many, but not all, municipalities have equipped their police forces with the breath-testing equipment and are ready to swing into action in the pre-Christmas period.

Mr. Turner was unable to say which ones lack the equipment.

The move will be accompanied by a publicity campaign in which the federal government has enlisted help from the Canadian Safety Council, car insurance and brewing industries.

However, distillers and auto accessory industries have not agreed to the federal government's request to participate in a public education program over the coming weeks.

Mr. Turner told a news conference he remains hopeful these groups will join the campaign. They were invited to a meeting here among Mr. Turner, federal Transport Minister Don Jamieson and various industries related to motoring.

Eleven Accidents Last Period

The Cayuga Detachment O.P.P. reports 11 property damage accidents investigated during the period of Nov. 9-15.

General occurrences investigated were 3 malicious damage, 3 thefts, 3 break and enters, 1 assault, 1 Criminal Code offence. Officers answered 11 requests for assistance.
