**Good Drainage Plan Must Be Combined With Good Practices**

Good drainage is important for agricultural crops, but frequently the returns from installation of drainage are not large enough to justify the total cost. Dr. W. S. Young, P.Eng., told a Drainage Engineers' Conference at Hespeler recently.

Dr. Young, who is Co-ordinator of Agricultural Extension for the Ontario Agricultural College, University of Guelph, was addressing the Conference which was sponsored jointly by the University of Guelph's School of Agricultural Engineering and by the Drainage Committee of the Association of Ontario Land Surveyors.

Dr. Young pointed out to the drainage engineers that removal of excess water from farm lands is only a single item in the over-all package of farm management. For optimum results, drainage must be coupled with improved farm practices in other phases of crop management such as improved fertility and weed control.

R. E. Clayton, P.Eng., Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food, Ridgeway, presented the design procedures followed by agricultural engineers. He suggested that removal of water gathered by tile drainage was the main purpose for requesting improved outlet drains. Outlet drains should therefore be constructed with this purpose in mind.

Dr. W. T. Dickinson, P.Eng., School of Agricultural Engineering, presented research results on the volume of water and the peak flows for which drainage facilities should be designed. He stressed that the frequent use of peak values for design would lead to unnecessarily expensive installations. It was proposed that surface storage be used to reduce these peak values.

R. D. Steele, Q.C., of Steele and Magee, Chatham, set out the bounds within which an engineer must work in a legal sense. He stated that when an engineer departs from these proper principles of assessment and responsibility, his entire report may be rejected. He pointed out that there are many problems and difficulties that may arise with drainage work and each must be dealt with on its own merits at the appropriate time.
