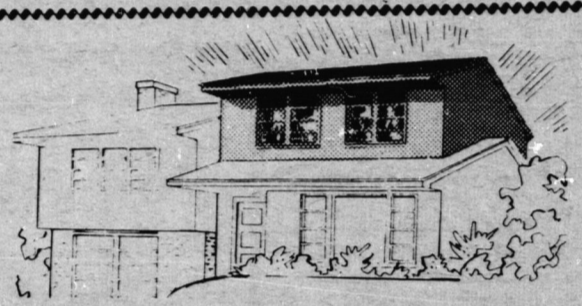

Food Storage For Better Taste

There's a place for everything but it could be the right place. Many staples and common foods will keep longer and taste better when stored in the proper place, say home economists, MacDonal Institute, University of Guelph.

Check these items in your kitchen.

Bread - keep tightly wrapped in a plastic bag, using the end crust as a cover for the rest of the loaf. Refrigeration is not necessary for short periods of time.

Butter - tightly wrapped or covered in refrigerator, away from all foods with odors.

Canned foods - after opening, keep covered in paper and keep in the refrigerator. They taste better if removed from can and put in a covered glass jar.

Cakes - in covered tin box.

Cheese - store in covered container in refrigerator.

Coffee - after opening, keep in the refrigerator. Use within two weeks.

Cookies - to keep crisp, put in airtight box, to keep soft, in a cookie jar.

Eggs - leftover eggs can be frozen or stored for a short time in a covered container in the refrigerator.

Fats - will keep indefinitely in a tightly covered tin in the refrigerator.

Fish - use fresh fish the same day that it is purchased. Jams, jellies - cool, dry, preferably dark places.

Meat - wrap in waxed paper and keep in the refrigerator.

Vegetables - cool, dark place for potatoes, onions, etc. Greens such as lettuce should be stored in a plastic bag in the refrigerator. Cut or partially used vegetables should also be in the refrigerator.

All dry staples should be covered tightly. Avoid exposure of foods to direct sunlight.
