**Hydro Backs Pollution Research Program**

Ontario Hydro has contributed \$140,000 to a four-year research program aimed at developing a system for the removal of sulphur dioxide from chimney effluents at thermal-electric power plants.

Fifteen United States electrical utilities have joined with Hydro in backing the \$6 million, three-phase study. Hopefully Babcock-Wilcox Company in association with the Esso Research and Engineering Company will devise a system whereby sulphur dioxide can be recovered either as sulphuric acid in chemical plants or as elemental sulphur.

Both are useful and profitable, by-products emitted from the combustion of coal.

The move by Hydro is part of an intensive campaign by the Commission for clean air around its thermal-electric generating stations.

Tomato Baked Beans with Sautéed Wieners Cabbage Slaw Sliced Pears

Easy on the dollar, easy on the cook, bean-based dishes pep up mealtime with old-fashioned goodness. For a real protein-packed meal, the Ontario Food Council, Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food, suggests you serve beans with wieners, luncheon meat, sausages, or Cheddar cheese. Or top beans temptingly with chopped apple, tomato, plump raisins, or maple syrup.

Plentiful and priced right, beans are an ideal complement for this fall meal.

**TOMATO BAKED BEANS**

7½ cups boiling water  
2½ cups dry white beans  
1 medium onion, sliced thin  
1/3 cup butter  
1 28-oz. can tomatoes and juice  
2 cups bean liquid (add water if necessary)  
1 tsp. salt  
1/8 tsp. dry mustard  
pinch of ginger  
dash of cayenne  
1/3 cup molasses  
1/3 cup chili sauce

1. Add beans to boiling water. Boil for 2 minutes. Cover tightly, remove from heat, and let stand 1 hour.  
2. Drain, reserving liquid, and turn beans into large saucepan.  
3. Combine 2 cups of reserved liquid with all remaining ingredients except molasses and chili sauce, and pour over beans. Bring to boil, reduce heat and simmer for 1 hour. Turn into 2-quart baking dish.  
4. Combine molasses and chili sauce. Pour over beans.  
5. Cover beans and bake at 325 degrees for 1 hour. Remove cover and bake 1 hour longer or until beans are tender.  
6. Serves six to eight.

Precipitators at all Hydro's new plants either operating or under construction are rated 99.5 percent efficient, while older units are being upgraded.

During the past two years the U.S. research team has developed a process called a "dry sorbent desulfurization system" which traps sulphur dioxide between the furnace and the stack.

Successful completion of the program will result in the eventual commercial development of the "sulphur trap" for use on boilers, both coal and oil fired, at thermal stations.

The 4-H Girl's Club and their mothers are to be asked to our December meeting.

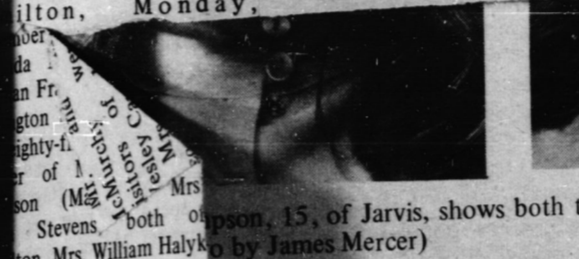
