Menu Of The Week

- Onion Supper Casserole*
- Stewed Tomatoes
- Cucumber Sticks
- Easy Broiled Pears

Did you know that one medium onion provides you with one-third of your daily requirement of vitamin C? Always a popular vegetable, high-quality Ontario onions are now in good supply, reminds the Food Council of the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food.

Tasty Bartlett pears, also in good supply, can be quickly broiled for dessert. Wash, halve, and core the pears. Top each half with ½ tsp brown sugar, a dot of butter, and cinnamon. Broil about 3 inches from the heat until the sugar is bubbly and the pears tender - delicious!

- Onion Supper Dish*
- 5 onions
- ¼ cup grated Ontario Cheddar cheese
- 1½ cups cubed cooked ham
- 2 cups toast cubes
- 1 tin cream of celery soup
- 1 cup milk
- salt, pepper
- 1/8 tsp dry mustard
- 1 tsp Worcestershire sauce

1. Peel onions and slice thickly.
2. In buttered 2-qt casserole, combine layers of sliced onions, cheese, ham, and toast cubes.
3. Mix together soup, milk, salt, pepper, mustard, and Worcestershire sauce. Pour into casserole.
4. Cover and bake at 350 F for 45 min.
5. Uncover and bake 30 min longer.
6. Serves six.

NOTE: Cooked chicken or tuna or crumbled, cooked bacon may be substituted for the ham.

International Award Winners

Two Canada Agriculture scientists have won the Jakob Eriksson award for their work in the highly specialized areas of mycology, plant pathology or virus diseases - but almost 40 years lie between the two achievements.

Dr. S. J. Hughes, of the Plant Research Institute, who was recognized for his taxonomic studies of Hyphomycetes, received his prize at the recent Eleventh International Botanical Congress in Seattle, Washington. Dr. J. H. Craigie, formerly Chief of the Division of Botany and Plant Pathology and Associate Director of Science Service, received his prize during the Fifth International Congress in Cambridge, England in 1930. He was honored for his early work on stem rust. Dr. Craigie is now retired.

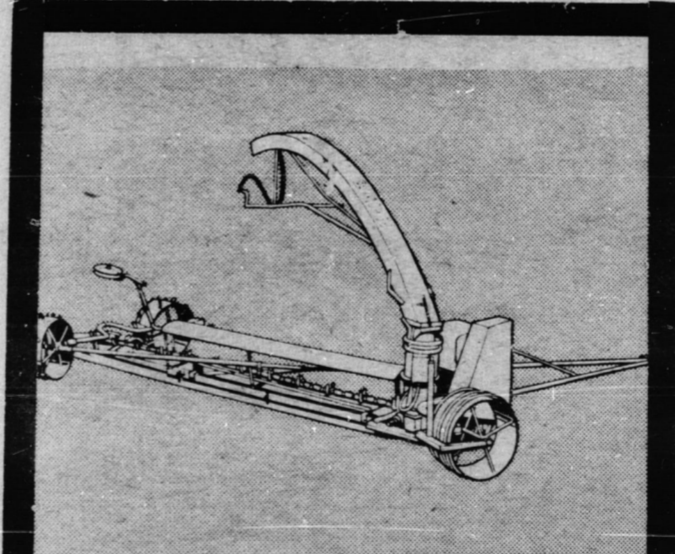
