This peculiarity of speech is called a "Spoonerism" named after the Rev. W. A. Spooner, who was associated with New College, Oxford for 62 years, ending as Warden (Principal). The name "New College" is typically English, as the college was new in 1379.

He was a character in several ways. On one occasion he gave an excellent address to a rural congregation on Aristotle. Then, as he left the pulpit he turned to the congregation and said: "I just want to say that in my sermon whenever I mentioned Aristotle, I should have said St. Paul."

In the quarterly magazine "Horizon" there is a delightful article by Mr. William Spooner Donald in which several Spoonerisms are quoted. Speaking to the students in one of his classes he said: "You have hissed all my mystery lessons, and completely tasted two whole worms." He announced the hymn in church as the following: "number 175 'Kinkering Kongs their titles take.'"

In a sermon he said: "Our Lord, we know, is a shoving Leopard," and "All of us have in our hearts a half-warmed fish to lead a better life."

He went into an opticians in London and asked for a "signifying glass." The optician said he had no such glasses. Spooner turned to go, saying, "Oh well, it doesn't magnify." Shortly after he had been appointed Warden he met a newly elected Fellow, a Mr. Casson. He said, "Do come to dinner tonight, we are welcoming our new Fellow, Mr. Casson." Said Casson, "But, my dear Warden, I am Casson." "Never mind, come all the same," said Spooner tactfully.

At a dinner he sat next to a lady who casually put her lily-white hand on the polished table. Spooner speared it with his fork, remarking "My bread I think."

He was evidently short sighted. Perhaps one of his most laughable remarks was the occasion when he said (referring to his bicycle) that he loved to "pedal gently round on a well-boiled icicle."

Today we are all so busy, and our universities so heavily engaged in science and mechanics, that we seem to have no room or place for such lovable characters. The loss is ours.
