The World's Upside Down

Somewhere along the line we parents must be falling short of teaching our offspring the standards and the knowledge of how to get their enjoyment out of just living without having to join in on spectacles.

The pop music festivals held during the weekend, which drew thousands of young people, were not much more than orgies similar to those held in Rome in the days of the Roman Empire.

It is time to upgrade the thinking of our young people so they will learn how to enjoy the simple life even if its from the viewpoint of just plain being alive.

Wise, Unwise And Otherwise

Look at your hand. Is it not a marvellous instrument? What things it can do, how marvellously it is organized to do almost anything that the brain requires of it. How did it come about that certain creatures have this marvellous instrument? According to the popular conception of Evolution the hand came into existence by the operation of Natural Selection and the survival of the fittest. Developments come about slowly, even taking thousands of years. I do not see how this can apply to the production of the hand. The rudimentary "hand" would appear as a lump or something of that sort, which would be a hindrance rather than a help to the creature possessing it, and this creature would not be "the fittest" and therefore would not survive.

Or could we imagine that one day some dog-like animal saw a tree and wished he could climb it, so by a little exercise of thought he produced an arm and a hand - even two of them. When you begin to go back on some of the ideas of modern science it makes you wish that some gifted author would write a book entitled "Fairy Tales from Science." I have been looking up Evolution in the Encyclopedia and the number of strange and mysterious words that I came across is worse even than the language of baseball and football, and I find it hard enough to understand those. But when you go behind the screen of ponderous words and try to express it in simple language you come across the fairy tales.

However, I do believe the evolutionary theory that all living creatures have developed from early simple forms of life. What interests me is "why did they develop?" and "how were they able to develop without being crushed in the struggle for existence?"

For me, there is only one answer *** namely that a Supreme and Intelligent Being not only started the evolutionary process but has been guiding and directing it ever since, and still is. The only other alternative is that the whole thing happened by chance. This is another Scientific Fairy Tale (you can work that out for yourself).

This Divine, Supreme Creator is the Being that we call God. We can well forget the old religious fairy tale that taught that God created everything, just as it is today, in one week. The first words in the Bible tell us that God made the universe, and that it was a process of development, which is very much like the evolutionary theory, especially when we remember it was written for people in a very elementary state of civilization.

If we go behind the symbolic language of Genesis I, we get, not a fairy story, but a reasonable description of God in the evolutionary process.

Dear Mr. Martin:
 I enjoy your columns very much, especially since I'm also a family financial counselor and I thought perhaps you might let me add my two cents worth.

The one thing I've noticed about counseling with families over the years is their reluctance to reveal all, financially. Most of the time you have to dig out this information and, of course, it's all for their own good. As you well know, if you don't have all the facts, you can't help the family effectively.

I recall one case recently where a husband and wife came to me to work out their financial difficulties. They were in debt quite heavily and needed a crash program to get them back on their feet. I was puzzled, however,

because there was approximately \$10 to \$12 unaccounted for each week.

It was only after some more probing that the missing money turned up. It seems that the wife was going to the hairdresser each week for a shampoo, set and style at a cost of about \$6. This was her relief and escape from the pressing problems at home.

The husband, on the other hand, went bowling once a week with the fellows from work. The bowling itself was not expensive, but they were always bowled "beer frames," which meant that the husband was usually dropping anywhere from three to six bucks a week.

Now, this doesn't seem much of an expense on an individual basis, but add them up over a month and you've got some \$40 which could be utilized in a much more productive way . . . like reducing the outstandings.

I finally convinced the couple that they should give up these "extravagances" until the emergency was over and suggested that they seek free recreational activities that would include the entire family.

I hope this will be of some help to your readers who may be seeking financial counseling.
