Revamp Agricultural Outlook Conference

OTTAWA, September 8, 1969 - Agriculture Minister H. A. (Bud) Olson, today unveiled several major changes in the format and content of the Canadian Agricultural Outlook Conference which will be held in Ottawa November 24 and 25.

The Conference, which has been held annually for more than 25 years, forecasts production and demand for agricultural produce.

"We're re-organizing both the format and content to provide information that's going to be of direct interest and importance to every farmer from coast to coast," Mr. Olson said.

The changes fall in line with Mr. Olson's announcement at the end of the Canadian Agriculture Congress in March that steps would be taken to change and strengthen the annual Canadian Outlook Conference.

"This week we are sending a team of eight economists to every region

across Canada to meet with provincial, university, major farm organization and regional experts from our department," Mr. Olson said.

"They will be discussing local, provincial and regional factors that could have a bearing on the commodity outlook papers. We are involving as many people as possible in this process, calling on the expertise of the entire industry, not only the Canada Department of Agriculture," Mr. Olson said.

During the Outlook Conference, more attention will be paid to the implications of the projections.

"For example, instead of merely telling farmers that there will be more hogs next spring, we will be calling on experts - most of them from outside our department - to outline the meaning of this type of projection to hog farmers in every part of Canada, to feed suppliers, to packing plants, to the entire industry," the Minister said.

The Conference has been expanded to include representatives and others concerned. "We plan to go to the people, instead of waiting for them to come to us for information. At these post-Conference meetings, more attention will be paid to regional and local differences within a commodity. We are offering our assistance to the regions and provinces to make this possible."

"These are changes we talked about at the Canadian Agriculture Congress, changes that will involve all sectors of the Canadian agricultural industry. We are making a concerted effort to provide more useful and meaningful information for our farmers," Mr. Olson said.

"We are also offering help to the provinces and regions that may wish to set up post-Conference meetings with farmers, trade

representatives and others concerned.
