He said the committee is awaiting more information from the CNR and a study showing the number on the Nanticoke Sideroad.

The new law has been given two readings, but council has refused a third until it has a written guarantee that the railway will install adequate warning signals at its own expense.

## 900 Students Attend Hagersville High

The four-year students in grade eleven have the chance to take French for beginners, with the emphasis on oral work.

World Politics is on the curriculum in Grade eleven and twelve, and two new commercial options, marketing and business administration, are being taught in grade twelve.

In Grade thirteen, Home Economics is offered for the first time. The course would be better named Sociology, as it centres on the family and human relations, and is available to boys as well as girls.

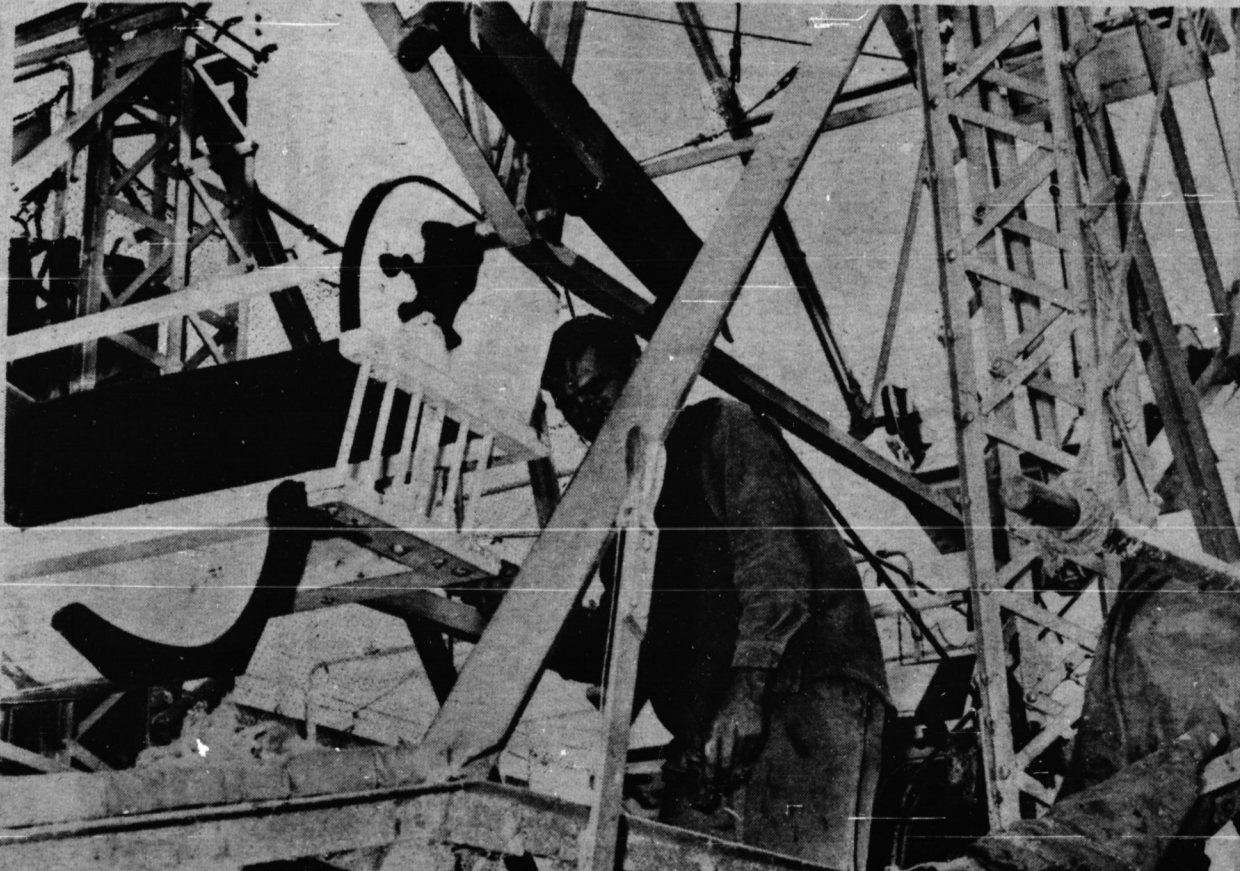
