SARNIA - Simcoe Cronkright Giants won their second Ontario Baseball Association Intermediate A-Major championship in three years Sunday. With a thrilling ninth-inning rally, the Giants edged Sarnia Braves 6-4 in the third and deciding game played at Erroll Russell Memorial Park.

The Giants took the opener of the best-of-three series by a 16-8 score but then bowed 9-6 in the second game... yesterday's tilt was worth the 120-mile trek.

Aircraft Makes Crash Landing

The Cayuga Detachment are investigating the crash of a light aircraft which occurred on September 26, 1969, at the Seneca Air Strip on the Stoney Creek Road, Seneca Township. The crash occurred when the craft was attempting to land. It was operated by Jack WIEBE, No. 20 Highway, Stoney Creek, and a passenger, Willard TRENHOLME, R.R. 1, Stoney Creek. Constable R. ADAMS and Corporal E. PARK are in charge of the investigation and are being assisted by the Department of Transport.
