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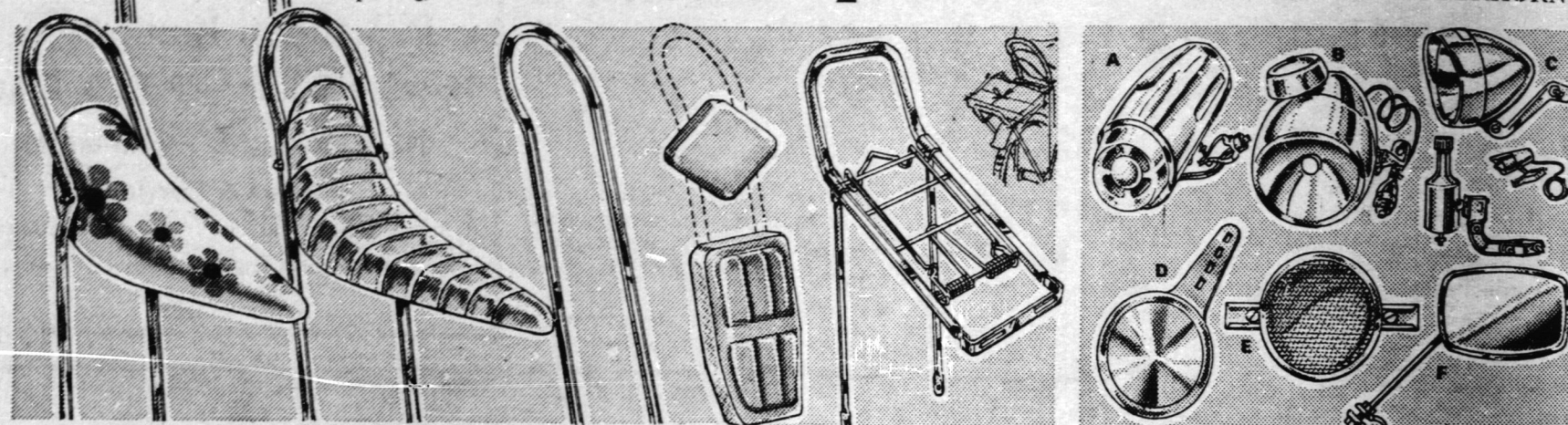

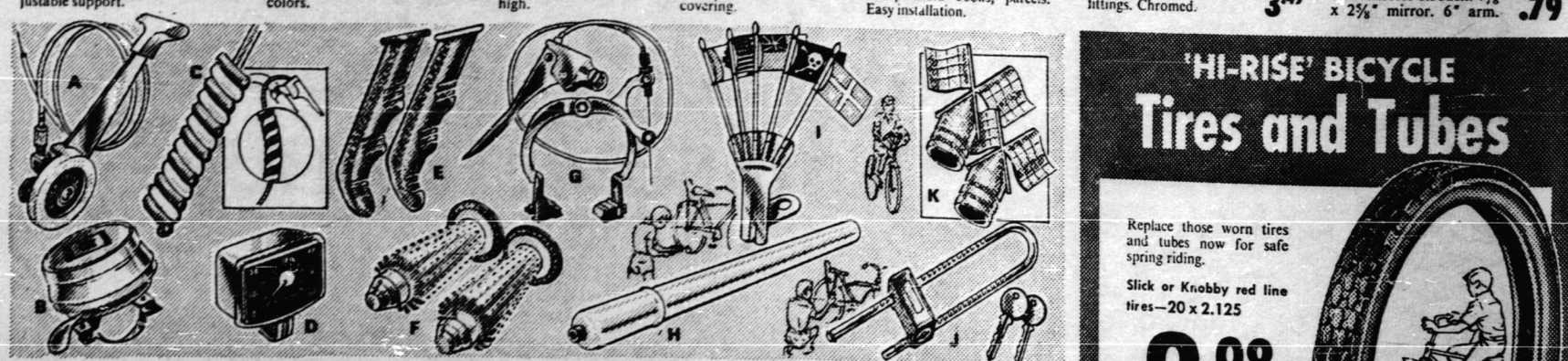

Drugs Major Problem In Society

Increasing use of drugs by a majority from the class parents may be because society is busy.

This was suggested by Donald Hunt, chaplain of Glendale and Ontario Training School.

He gave his impressions of the use of drugs and the problems they create through the media of films and records at a meeting of the Happy Doubles Club at the Wesley United Church Tuesday.

His films and records showed research findings and physical and mental affects on people in particular through the use of L.S.D.

He said the most uncertain part of the increased use of drugs in our society today is what effect it will have on future generations.

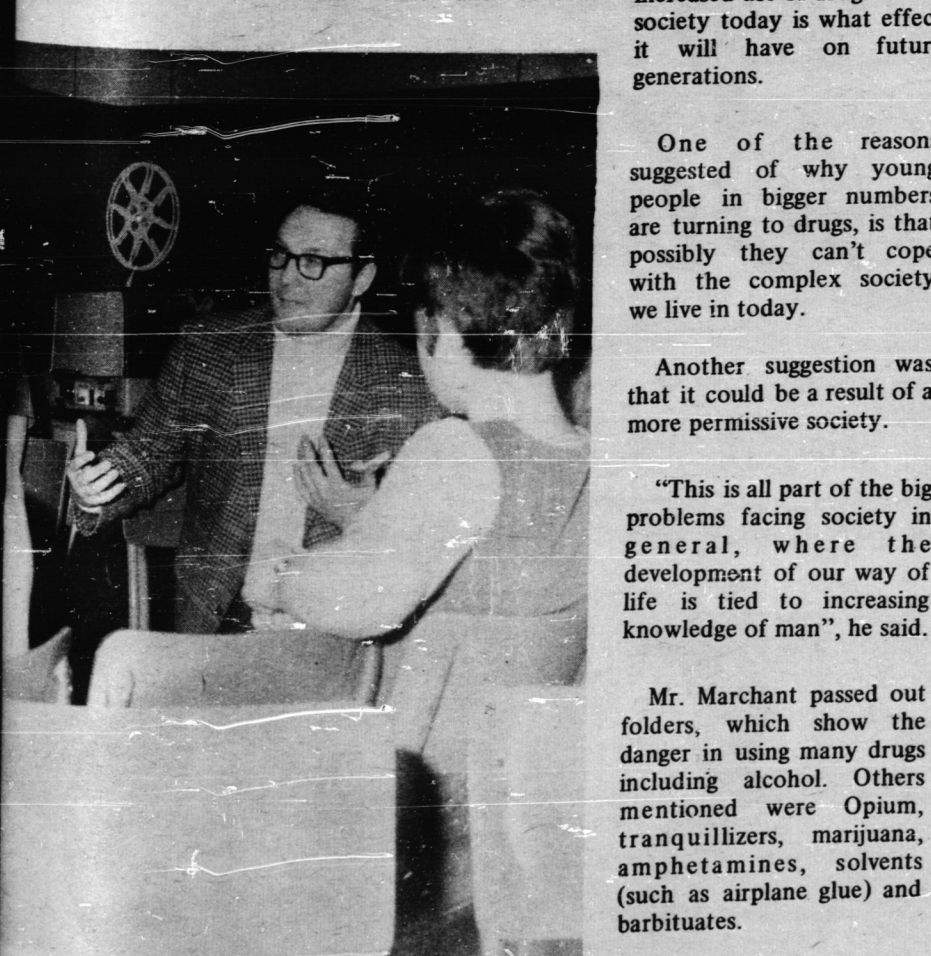
One of the reasons suggested of why young people in bigger numbers are turning to drugs, is that possibly they can't cope with the complex society we live in today.

Another suggestion was that it could be a result of a more permissive society.

"This is all part of the big problems facing society in general, where the development of our way of life is tied to increasing knowledge of man", he said.

Mr. Marchant passed out folders, which show the danger in using many drugs including alcohol. Others mentioned were Opium, tranquilizers, marijuana, amphetamines, solvents (such as airplane glue) and barbiturates.

Stelco Construction Plan Still Uncertain

The Steel company of Canada is unchanged in its announcement that there will be no construction at its Nanticoke Site this year.

A Stelco spokesman, however, told The Record that some work is going on at the site.

The spokesman said the company is just finishing fencing along road improvement areas.

"We are also finishing some minor grading to complete some work that couldn't be finished last fall", he said.

The spokesman said the program will be reviewed at the end of the year.

Stelco announced last year that it would start construction of a Hot Strip Steel Mill at its Nanticoke Site this summer. Plans were cancelled because of the uncertainty of the economy and the outcome of the proposed taxation changes in the white paper, which will be considered this year.

Lake Erie Cleared On Mercury Pollution

Ontario and federal officials have cleared perch and pickerel catches taken from Lake Erie.

Fish still are being inspected as they come from the lake to make sure that they have little or no mercury contamination.

Lake St. Clair and Dryden lakes have been closed for this season. Federal and Ontario officials are conferring to see if compensation arrangements can be made to fishermen in those lakes.

In parliament Fisheries Minister Jack Davis proposed compensation for fishermen for both Lake Erie and Lake St. Clair.

Mr. Brunelle said the ban on fishing would include all commercial and sport fishing on Lake St. Clair. The St. Clair and Detroit Rivers, which form a link between Lake Erie and Lake St. Clair.

The perch seized by the officials were sent to the fisheries department's research centre at Winnipeg for analysis.

The government has banned commercial fishing on Lake St. Clair and Detroit rivers, and has halted exports of fish, mostly perch and pickerel sent to United States markets.

Dr. John George, member of a research team at the University of Western Ontario in London, said research carried by his team last fall in the St. Clair area had discovered pickerel carrying up to 40 times the safe level of mercury.

Mercury content in the fish tested was between one and two parts per million. The safety level recommended by the World Health Organization is .05 parts per million.

Mr. Writth was asked if perch were now making up the larger percentage of the seine hauls and he said, "No, panfish such as sunfish and bluegills make up the larger percentage of the hauls and as far as pickerel are concerned, we haven't caught any for five or six years."

Eleven commercial seines and two hoop net operations are active in the bay waters.

The blame for mercury contamination of Lake St. Clair has been placed on Dow Chemical of Canada's Sarnia plant. Lake Erie mercury pollution has been attributed to Wyandotte Chemicals Company of Wyandotte, Michigan.

'Blue Barn' Opening Success

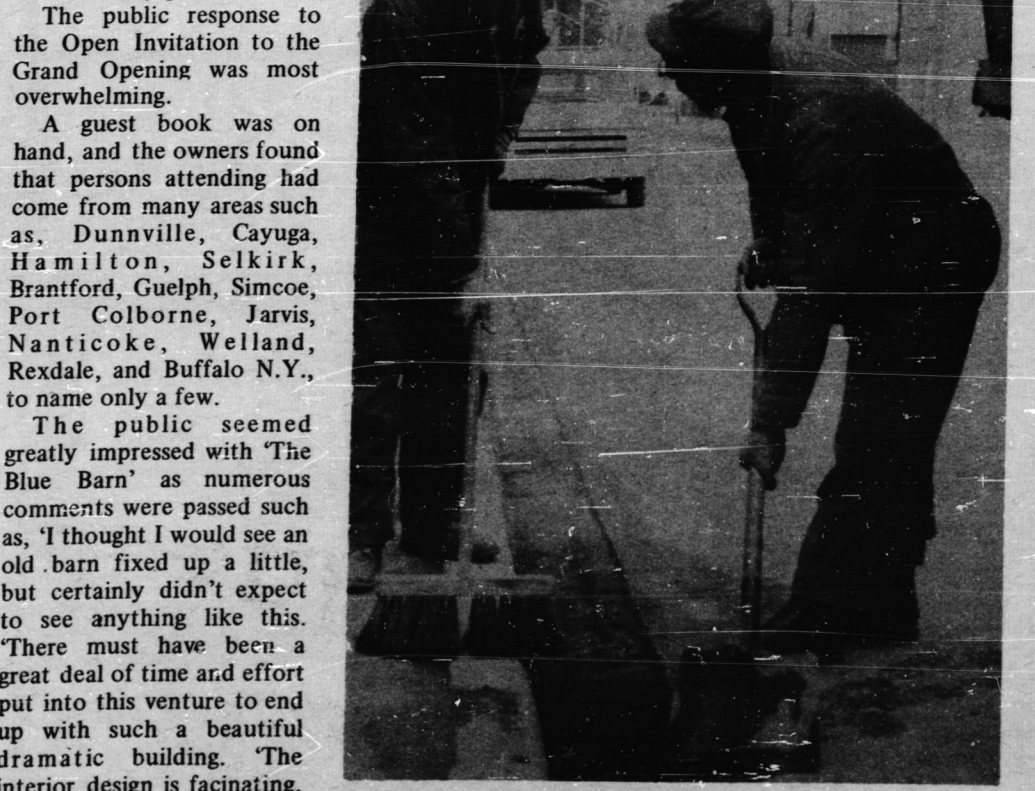
Haldimand County's newest business, Quality Home Furnishings Co., 'The Blue Barn', enjoyed a most successful Grand Opening last week.
