

Teatime Topics

Kitchens and kitchen equipment evolve over years to match the cook's inclination, budget and family, but if you are just starting, there are basics it is nice to have.

Among your pots and pans, you should have: a 10 to 12-inch covered skillet, a 6-inch skillet without a cover, a 4-quart covered saucepan, a small (2-quart) saucepan without a cover and another with a cover, a double boiler and a Dutch oven that can also be used as a kettle for boiling large things or large quantities of things.

For the oven you should have a medium-sized roasting pan with a rack, 2 round 9-inch cake pans, 1 square 8 to 9-inch cake pan, 1 medium sized loaf pan, 2 pie pans, a 1-to-1 1/2 quart covered casserole, 2 cake racks for cooling baked goods, 2 muffin tins.

Some optional but useful equipment, depending on what you like to eat, includes: tea kettle, kitchen shears, egg poacher, meat pounder for tenderizing (you can use the back of a knife blade), individual salad moulds, garlic press, custard cups, pastry blender (you can use two knives), pastry cloth and cover for rolling pin, large salad mould, another skillet in 10-to-12-inch size, large roasting pan with rack, large kettle, rectangular cake pan, tube cake pan, 2 round 8-inch cake pans, covered 4-quart casserole, canister set.

In the drawers and cupboards you might find handy: rolling pin (you can use a bottle), measuring spoons, biscuit cutter (you can use a glass), cookie sheet, cookie cutters (if you like them fancy), a 5-inch strainer, colander, knife set that includes meat carver and paring knife, bread knife, cutting board.

You may want a vegetable chopper and potato peeler but patience and a good paring knife can make them less than necessary.

You should have measuring cups, a wooden spoon, a large two-tined fork, spatula, potato masher, ladle, tongs, rubber bowl scraper, pancake turner, slotted spoon, wire whisk (helps make gravies and sauces come out smooth), basting brush, suction type baster.

A set of mixing bowls is a must, a rotary beater, a 4-sided grater as well for small things such as lemon rind, a meat grinder, a flour sifter, can and bottle opener.

If you like things absolutely fresh, you may want a fruit juice squeezer. Small meat skewers are useful, especially for large roasts or chicken or turkey. A meat thermometer takes the guesswork out of cooking roasts.

A knife sharpener keeps good equipment in good shape and makes your work easier.

Electric appliances to consider are an automatic toaster, an automatic coffee maker and a portable mixer.

OPP Report

Recent complaints have been received at this Detachment office that mail boxes on No. 3 Highway, in the vicinity of the Cheapside Road, have been damaged on different occasions by unknown persons. Any information received will be held in strict confidence and greatly appreciated.

Complaints have also been received that local youths in Cayuga are using the J. L. Mitchener School ground as a training base in the operation of motorcycles. By-Law 633 prohibits unusual or unnecessary noise in the village. Knowing the majority of those involved are pre-licence age, it is most essential that a thorough knowledge be obtained before drivers permits are issued, therefore Prov. Const. H. J. Bell will assist if contacted, in finding a suitable location for this type of training.

On April 8, 1970, Prov. Const. W. L. Eves arrested a Hamilton youth on a charge of arson resulting in the burning of a cottage at Featherstone Point.

On April 8, 1970, Prov. Const. H. J. Bell recovered a car in Oneida Township, reported stolen from Saltfleet Township.

On April 8, 1970, Prov. Const. W. L. Bessey charged two male persons resulting in the theft of a car from Springvale on March 19, 1970.

Prov. Const. H. J. Bell, Safety Officer, visited two schools and presented the bicycle safety to 160 children.

Officers investigated a total of six motor vehicle collisions resulting in injuries to four persons. Officers patrolled a total of 7,655 miles, issued 19 warnings and 34 charges to motorists. On April 8, 1970, 19 convictions were registered in Provincial Judges Court, Cayuga, Ontario.

General occurrences investigated were: one theft, four break and enters, three other Criminal Code offences, two Liquor Control Act investigations resulting in two charges being laid, 15 requests for assistance.

An unfortunate accident occurred on County Road No. 18, Seneca Township, April 10 to a Hamilton man while riding on the back of a truck. He fell off and struck his head on the pavement. He was admitted to St. Joseph's Hospital, Hamilton, Ontario, with a fractured skull.

Federation News.

Gordon Hill, President of The Ontario Federation of Agriculture, challenges the National Farmers' Union to put their claims about voluntary collective bargaining into action. He suggests that the NFU start with soybeans. If that proves successful, he says that corn could be the next commodity to work on.

The O.F.A. President warns that farmers must be aware of attempts by the NFU to destroy orderly marketing program without having any practical, proven alternative to offer as a replacement.

Mr. Hill points out that threatening actions are being taken by NFU members and their sympathizers against the Ontario Milk Marketing Board, the Ontario Hog Producers' Marketing Board and other marketing groups. A petition against the OMMB is being circulated by NFU members in Eastern Ontario.

The Federation recognizes that marketing boards have not yet solved all marketing problems. But Mr. Hill emphasizes that progress to date indicates that the marketing legislation must be strengthened, not destroyed, in order to build even better marketing boards.

The NFU has been calling for some time for voluntary collective bargaining to replace the commodity marketing boards. The Federation believes that the best way to determine the value of the NFU plan is for the union to use it on one or two commodities and to allow farmers to assess its merit after a fair trial period.

Mr. Hill says that it is easy for the NFU to stand on the sidelines and do nothing but criticize. He explains that farmers should understand that the new national marketing

legislation deals only with inter-provincial and export trade, leaving marketing within a province affair. The Federation leader calls on all farmers to build a better marketing system and prove its effectiveness before destroying what has been built over the years through the joint efforts of thousands of farmers and the O.F.A.

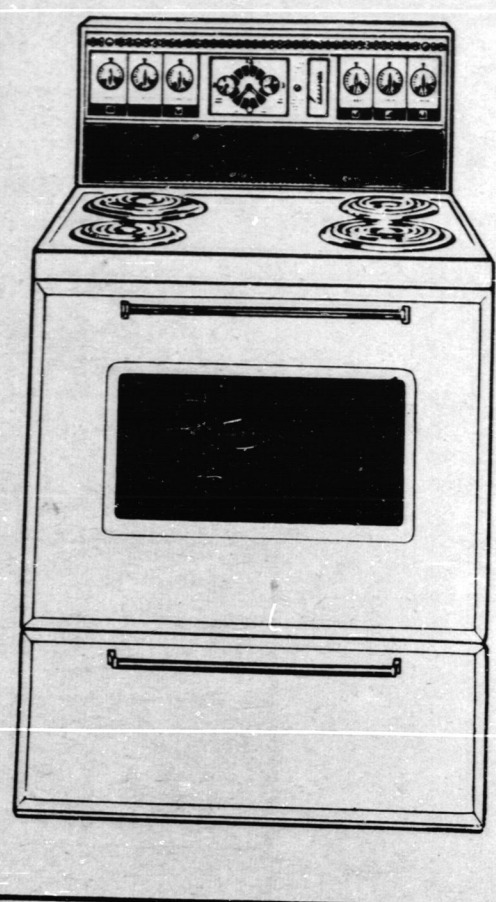
