by Doug Galbraith W. Scott Miller owns the most easterly tobacco farm in Southwestern Ontario. The farm, which has a basic acreage of 22.25 acres. is located on Highway 3

about two miles west of Jarvis. This is about six miles east of fringe area for tobacco farms just east of Simcoe. Mr. Scott told The Record that he has grown 11 crops on the farm along with many general crops

beef cattle, He said. All this is surrounded by mostly general farms that produce livestock, grains and corn.

Mr. Scott said that he has used the variety Delhi 34 last season and has found he zets good success with this in his black loamy land that is similar to land found in the high-yield producing area of Burford.

Mr. Scott said his yields are continuing to climb and was better than 1,700 pounds an acre last year.

Mr. Scott grew tobacco in the Simcoe area before purchasing his present farm.
