Canadian participation in international hockey competition may be gone—but not forgotten.

Weekend Magazine sports editor Andy O'Brien says Canadians should cease their 'pure, unadulterated cockeyed thinking' and get back into competition.

He said definite plans once existed for games between the National Hockey League and the Soviet Union's world amateur champions.

Naturally, the deal is off, now that Canada has abandoned international hockey.

O'Brien, in an address to the Toronto Advertising and Sales Club, said NHL president Clarence Campbell and John F. (Bunny) Ahearne, head of the International Ice Hockey Federation, agreed upon details of the showdown the sport is waiting for.

He told of the Campbell-Ahearne pact and said:

'At a dinner in my home, I may now say without qualification, was laid the groundwork, for a series between NHL teams or team and Russia.

'All that has blown sky-high with the to-hell-with-you triumph of our amateur hockey chieftans and the cancellation of the 1970 tournament in Canada.'

This, he said, was one of several reasons he took issue with Hockey Canada's decision to withdraw from world hockey after European countries reneged on an earlier agreement to permit Canada to include nine professionals on its 1970 club.

Loss of the 1970 championships as a Canadian promotion should have been a major consideration, he contended.

He estimated the tournament games scheduled for Montreal would have been a major

consideration, he contended. d have grossed \$1,000,00 and those in Winnipeg \$700,000.

Over-all cost of staging the tournament in both cities would not have exceeded \$400,000, he said. O'Brien said the only contributions Hockey Canada has made have been negative ones: the cancellation of the first-ever world hockey tournament in Canada and the disbanding of our national team.

He called on Canadians to stop moaning about Russia's

'professional' hockey players and get back to the business of developing a national team which could compete successfully under existing rules.

He strongly recommended the restoration of senior hockey, and the Allan Cup, to its former status as one means of developing players of international calibre.

These senior players should be athletes rising to their peaks rather than ex-pros, in O'Brien's opinion.

Such a program, he said, will establish a pool of players from which a representative side could be drawn, the way it was when Canada was still winning world titles back in 1958, 1959 and 1961.

Courses Emphasizes Milk Quality

Dairy farming predominates in Northern Ontario and the quality of milk produced is naturally a factor with which most farmers concern themselves. Because of this, the New College of Agriculture and Animal Husbandry, which concentrates on a Dairy Course that teaches students the essentials of quality milk production and quality control on the dairy farm.

The course is offered in the senior year of the two-year diploma course in agriculture. Mr. Les Hill, of the Ontario Milk Commission, who cooperates with the College in the teaching of this course, said that milk composition, bacteriology, butterfat testing and the manufacture of cheese and powdered milk products are among the topics covered.

Quality regulations, the cleaning and maintenance of milk machines, farm scoring and barn construction are also dealt with. The large College farm does not include a dairy herd, so many field trips are made to neighboring dairy operations to give students a first hand knowledge of milk production. Milk machines are dismantled and rebuilt for comprehensive study, and processing equipment is cleaned and examined. The course concentrates on being a general guide to quality milk production because unless farmers match the standards set by the Ontario Milk Commission they cannot sell their product.

Annual Meeting Of Girl Guides

Sixty years after Guiding started in St. Catharines, 500 adult members will gather in nearby Niagara Falls for the Annual Meeting and Conference of the Ontario Council, Girl Guides of Canada, Guiding du Canada.

The Conference will be held in the Sheraton Brook Hotel April 30 to May 2. Theme of the conference will be the intrinsic values of Guiding, ie, the Promise and Law, Duty to God, what and who is God. The program has been designed to help leaders evaluate principles sixty years standing in the light of the needs of to-days girl.

Mrs. John Corbett of Westmount, Quebec, a former Canadian Chief Commissioner, will open the conference with an address to stimulate discussion and the exchange of ideas. Thursday afternoon, Mrs. B. M. Russell, Deputy Chairman of the National Program Committee, will present a session entitled "Discovery in Song."

The guest speaker Friday morning will be Rabbi Stuart E. Rosenberg of Toronto.

Following the Annual meeting on Friday afternoon, Mrs. Corbett will summarize the findings of the conference discussions.
