**1 Killed—10 Injured In Two Crashes**

Two crashes within three hours of each other east of here Monday killed a Thorald man and injured 10 persons.

In the first crash Ian Black, 26, of 17 Elgin St. Thorald was pronounced dead at the scene by Dr. A. Lyons, of Jarvis. He was the driver of one of three vehicles involved.

Driver of a second car was Mrs. Clara Wedrick, 76, of 135 Union St. Simcoe. William Henry Smith, 39, of Lathrup Village, Mich., was the driver of a camper truck. The crash occurred at the Nanticoke - Highway 3 intersection.

Mrs. Wedrick received a broken leg, broken knee caps, a broken right wrist, scalp cuts and bruises. She is reported in fair condition in the Norfolk General Hospital.

Mr. Smith is reported in good condition in the West Haldimand General Hospital. His wife Marilee, 39, is reported still in critical condition in St. Joseph Hospital, Hamilton.

Their daughters Lorilee, six, and Susan, nine, are in good condition in the W.H.G.H. Both received multiple cuts and bruises. A brother William, 11, was released from the hospital after treatment for cuts and bruises.

The crash was investigated by Const. Jim Edmondson of Cayuga OPP. Damage was estimated at \$6,900. The Wedrick car at \$1,800; Black's at \$3,550 and the Smith truck and trailer \$1,600. The accident was reported at 1:45 p.m.

In the second crash, four miles east of Jarvis on Highway 3, a Model "A" show car was involved with a 1970 auto.

Four people were injured. The antique car was driven by Norman Arthur Swanson, 18, of Greensboro, N.C. and the other car by Miss M. Akanlar, 24, of Birmingham, Mich.

Police said an unidentified driver passed the eastbound Swanson car forcing Miss Akanlar, who was westbound off the road, putting her car out of control when it crashed into the other vehicle.

Admitted to hospital were Swanson with multiple cuts and bruises, Cliff Sauten, 19, also of Greensboro, with cuts, bruises and head injuries and Donald Boyd of Warren Mich., owner of the antique car, with a broken arm. Miss Akanlar was released after treatment for cuts and bruises.

Const. Walter Eves of Cayuga OPP investigated the crash reported at 4:35 p.m.

**Other, Five Pups Starve**

A female dog and five pups which had been left to die, were found by Warren Berkely of Moulton Township on Sunday July 26.

In a report to Moulton Township Council Hiliard says, canine control officer, said the female had died with a stout rope around her neck.

She had been without drinking water when she was found and had dried up.

She was unable to feed her pups, which were all dead.

Mr. Graves said the female was found in a bush near Mr. Berkely had seen one of the pups on the road and followed to the bush.

Mr. Graves said the pups were also all females and he didn't find anyone who would look after them. They probably all have to be destroyed unless someone is found, he said.

It is unknown who left the dogs to starve to death. Authorities are investigating.

**Hope Finance Available Grand River Project**

The Grand River Conservation Authority hopes it will get grants for its five-dam control program by the end of next month.

Chairman James Bauer said that federal and provincial government treasurers will meet next month and he thinks there is a possibility the meeting will result in a proposal for financing the project.

The program has been stalled for about five years. The estimated cost for its completion is \$44 million over a 15-year period.

The authority claims the project will provide flood control, pollution abatement, recreation areas and a new water supply.

Mr. Bauer said the Ontario Department of Energy and Resources Management is sympathetic to the problem.

The province has been reluctant to commit itself to 75 percent of the cost until it has determined what federal funds will be available for the project.

He said the provincial government hopes to have some financial answers by the end of September.
