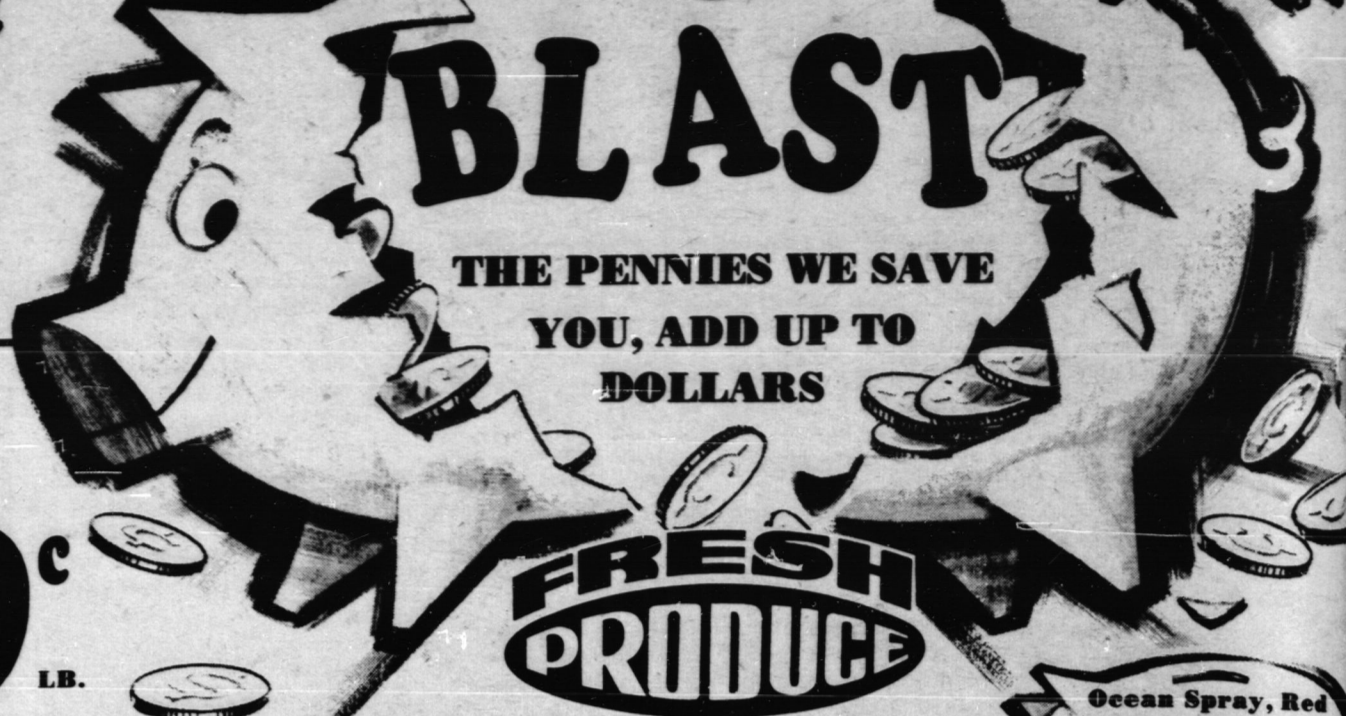

E. J. Little, a Texaco public relations officer, said many various stages would have to be made before the company starts construction.
Texaco has 1,310 acres of land under option for which a final purchase can now be made.
Mr. Little said Texaco will work very closely with Walpole Township, the Ontario Department of Municipal Affairs, the Air Management Branch and the Ontario Water Resources Commission.
He said the company couldn't be definite about

when construction will start but other sources have indicated that some work will be started right away.
He said the initial capacity of the refinery would be 50,000 barrels a day.
Mr. Little said the refinery would have about 175 permanent employees of whom only a few are now with the company. During construction about 1,000 employees will be on the job, he said.

In a breakdown of costs between the two systems it works out cheaper to use the old method.
He said it costs \$7 an acre to get combining done and 10 cents a bale to get straw baled. This works out to between \$5 and \$6 an acre.
In the breakdown of the old way it costs \$3 an acre for thrashing, \$2.50 an acre for stooking, and cutting \$3.50 an acre.
In comparison this means it costs \$12 an acre to get combining and baling done while it costs \$9 for the binder method.
