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### Haldimand To Integrate Busses For Elementary And Secondary Students

Secondary and elementary students will all ride in one bus under a new transportation policy of the

Haldimand Board of Education, the Record has learned.

In Jarvis and area a bus will take students to the Jarvis Public School. An express bus will take secondary school students from there to Hagersville.

Secondary students in the village will be expected to walk to the J.P.S. Buses will return them in the afternoon.

Under this year's transportation scheme the board plans to move both secondary and elementary students in the same buses.

The board warns students to leave nothing to chance and to be ready and waiting for a bus when school opens on Tuesday.

The board has also decided that all four secondary schools in the county will operate through the noon hour to minimize confusion in the integrated

transportation. In the Cayuga area integrated buses will be picking up and discharging at both the J. L. Mitchener Public School and the Cayuga Technical and Commercial High School.

Secondary students living near the Mitchener Public School can board a bus at the public school and ride directly to the C.T.C. However, this service will only be provided in the morning.

Secondary students on Con. 14 of Walpole Township and above plus elementary students above will be transported on one bus to the Hagersville Secondary School and Norview Public School.

Elementary students on Con. 14 of Walpole and all kindergarten pupils will continue to be bused to North Walpole Public School.

The remainder of North Walpole elementary and secondary students will be transported to North Walpole in the morning. Two express runs will take students to the Hagersville Secondary School.

### Lions Sponsor Walkathon

The 18-Mile walk is to be held on Saturday, September 19.

The route is as follows: Starting from Jarvis Community Centre Walkers will go north on Highway No. 6 to Hagersville and then West on Mud Street to the Town Line. From there south on the Town Line to Highway No. 3 and return to the starting point.

Proceeds from the walk will be used for the new addition to the Jarvis Centre which includes enlarged and improved kitchen facilities, storage rooms, and a modern grounds booth operated out of the main building. The estimated cost is \$20,000.00.

Sponsors first and walkers of all ages are needed to make this project a success. Instructions will appear in an advertisement in this paper.

The Board also announced that North Walpole School will open at 8:40 a.m. and close at 3:10 p.m.

Lloyd Baldson, Queensville, captured the trophy for the Grand Champion Bull.

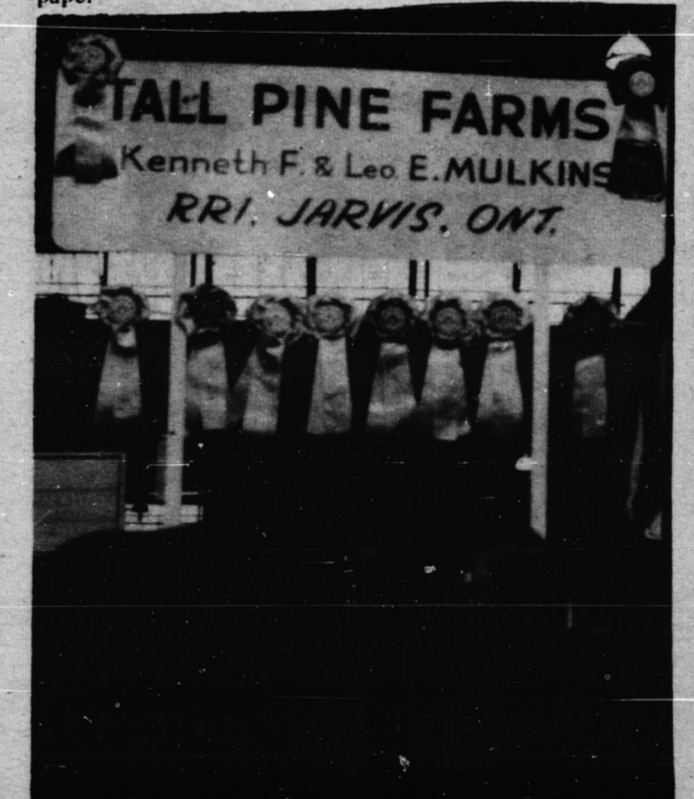
Watch next week's issue for results of local farmers who had entries in beef classes. These were not available at press time.
