Nixon Asserts 'Middle Of Road' Policy

About 300 Liberals of Haldimand-Norfolk Riding welcomed Ontario opposition leader Robert Nixon to an Oyster supper held by the Jarvis Community Hall in Jarvis on Friday night. Nixon, who was the guest speaker, said he would be the best speaker. As a farmer, a prominent agriculturist, a scholar and a politician. Mr. Nixon stated the combination of the father and son had represented Brant County in the house for 51 years. He said he had great respect for N. Allan and Jack Humber as had all political parties.

He pledged the Liberals to pursue the "Middle of the Road" to improve the country. He scored the NDP being too far to the left. He said he doesn't approve government taking over source industries. He attended the new leader, Stephen Lewis, was a radical leftist reflecting the views of the large industry, large unions.

When the election time comes many of these will be as individuals, not as Socialists. He also criticized the conservatives who are opposed to be good organizers. He cited Naughton and Davis who admitted they didn't know much money they had and had to ask for money in the first quarter of 1970.

He stated "No new taxes" but collected 20,000,000 more than needed and had to give farmers a rebate to help their taxes. Tax reform important, more so each year.

Licence Plate Time Again

It's licence plate time again for the motorists and the local licence offices are bracing themselves for another busy season. Even though vehicle owners are given three months to obtain their plates, February is usually the busiest with sometimes a one or two hour waiting period because of the long line up. It is suggested that to avoid unnecessary waiting, purchase your 1971 plates as soon as possible. Licence plates this year will be white on a blue background, and the cost will be the same as last year. Four cylinder passenger cars and dual-purpose vehicles \$20, six cylinder units \$27.50 and eight cylinder vehicles \$35. Motorcycle plates also are available Dec. 1 at \$10 per machine. Snowmobile enthusiasts will find their 1970 plates have expired Oct. 31, 1970. The 1971-72 plates cost \$4 and are good for two years. Their colour this year is yellow on a blue background. Commercial and trailer - full year and quarterly licence plate information may be obtained at the local office. The plate deadline for the auto and dual-purpose vehicles is midnight Feb. 27.
