Descendent Of Pioneer Visits Nanticoke And Jarvis

Dr. Roy Wood Sellars gave a review of the life of his ancestor Mich, a former student of philosophy at the University of Michigan, died Monday. He was accompanied by his cousin

Mrs. W. D. Stalker of Simcoe at whose home he is staying while looking up past history of his father's family.

He is the son of the late Dr. Ford Wood Sellars who was born in Nanticoke and taught at the Saunders

School (No. 17) now demolished. The Sellars home was across from the Union Cemetery on Erie St., Nanticoke. This burial ground was the gift to the community by settler and a captain in the war of 1812-14. David Wood arrived in Nanticoke in 1834. He was able through his war records to purchase 1200 acres of land along the Nanticoke road on either side as well as several town lots in Nanticoke - these at a very nominal sum. David

Wood was an industrialist in his day. He was born in Edinburgh Scotland in 1794. He built the dam at Nanticoke and a wharf out into Lake Erie doing business by shipping cordwood and walnut by lake freighter. The wood was taken to the large boats by means of a type of boat called a "Lighter." He also had a sawmill and cloth mill in the area. His home was built of hand made bricks on the farm now owned by Snowden Bros., and formerly owned by the late Bert Kendry. The brick
