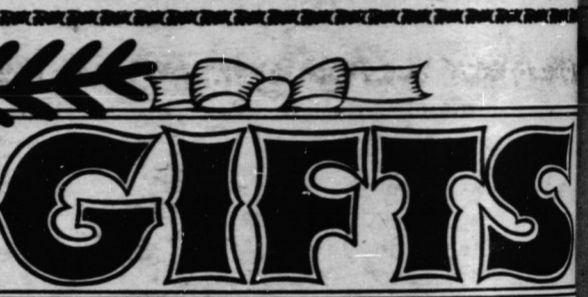
Late in the game, Hawk forward Dave Hawthorne snapped in a long shot to close the gap. The buzzer sounded and the score read 3-2 Springvale.

It was Punch's first official visit to the Gardens since the Leafs dismissed him as coach after the 1969-70 season.

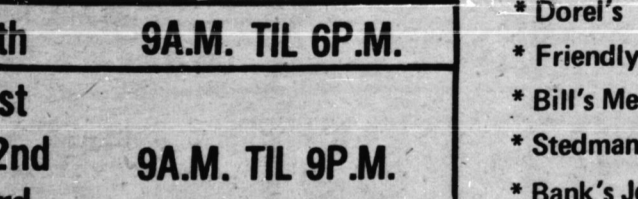
The more than 16,000 fans gave Imlach a standing ovation.
