Cayuga OPP Busy

Cayuga Provincial Police had a busy weekend with a number of breakins and other incidents during the weekend.

In Canborough Township Mrs. Arvilla Acland, 81, was locked in a closet while her home was ransacked.

Thieves made off with \$725 in cash as well as a diamond ring valued at \$500, a man's ring that had been converted to a lady's ruby ring for which no value has been determined.

Mrs. Acland was first tied by the intruders, than untied and locked in a closet. She was able to force the door open and call police at 4.50 pm yesterday. Const. Gerald Broughton of Cayuga OPP is investigating.

In Jarvis intruders were caught in the act as they had forced their way into the Jarvis Meat Market owned by Lloyd Garner, Main St.

Police said a rear door of the premises had been forced to gain entry.

Charged with breaking and entry with intent are Larry James McKenzie, 18, of Jarvis, Harley Snively, 17, of RR 5, Hagersville and Douglas Arthur Laforme, 19, of RR 5, Hagersville.

Slote New Hagersville Reeve

HAGERSVILLE - Veteran Hugh Greenfield, reeve of Walpole, lost a close race for the reeveship of this Village to Ross Slote who served as a councillor this term.

Deputy-reeve Jack Kincaid was also acclaimed at the first meeting.

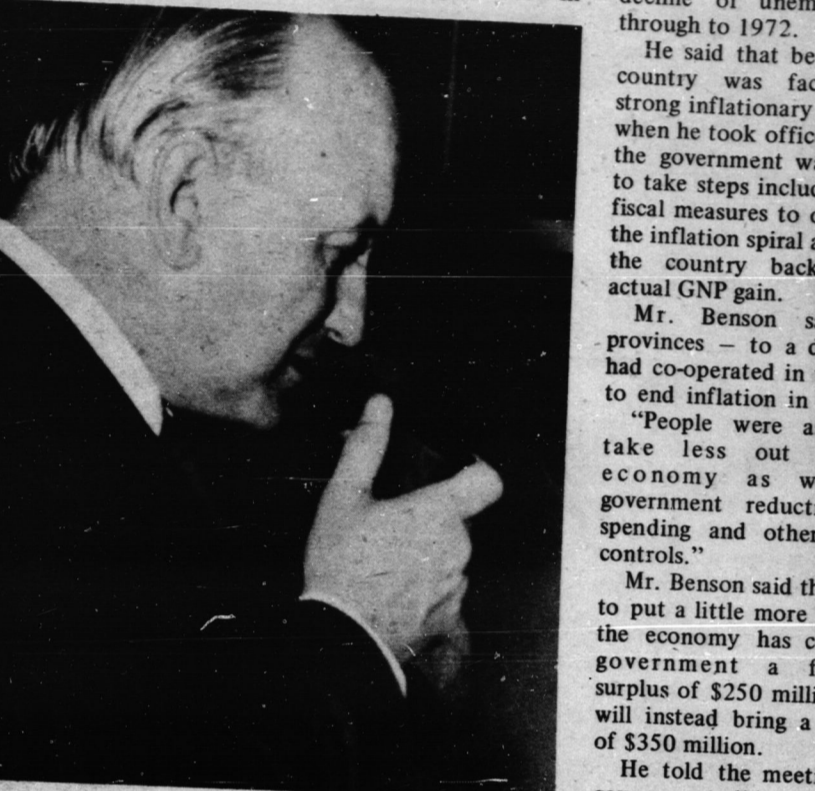

Mr. Kindy in his year of service faced one of the biggest predicted changes in the history of the county with big industry proposing to settle on the north shore of Lake Erie near Nanticoke.
