Dollars And Good Sense

I've been saying for some time that good family money management education is urgently needed for all families, including the wealthy. The public's interest in the subject was recently dramatized following a local television program in Washington, D.C.

An executive of the U.S. National Consumer Finance Association was the guest on an interview show and answered questions concerning the consumer finance field and discussed family money management. Immediately after the broadcast, viewers began calling the local television station at an unprecedented rate and also deluged the association's office seeking more information on money management education.

The program was so well received by viewers that further broadcasts are being considered.

Of all the subjects being taught in our schools, money management and family budget planning is sorely neglected and greatly needed. As the Washington incident attests, it is also strongly desired.

All families need and want some basic advice on how to handle their money and how to get the most out of their spending power.

As I've reported in this column, everyone needs a plan to control spending and forecast individual financial needs. The plan can be as detailed or as general as you like - as long as it is effective for you.

Planning alone is not enough, however. You must understand a little about our finance and credit systems and know how to spend your money to make it pay for as much as it can.

There are professional money management consultants in most areas and many lenders offer such services free of charge. As more and more people realize the need for good money management education, this service will be more readily available to a greater number of people and may work its way into our schools as a required course of instruction.
