Congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. Bing Lundy on the arrival of their baby boy born Monday night in Norfolk General Hospital, Simcoe.

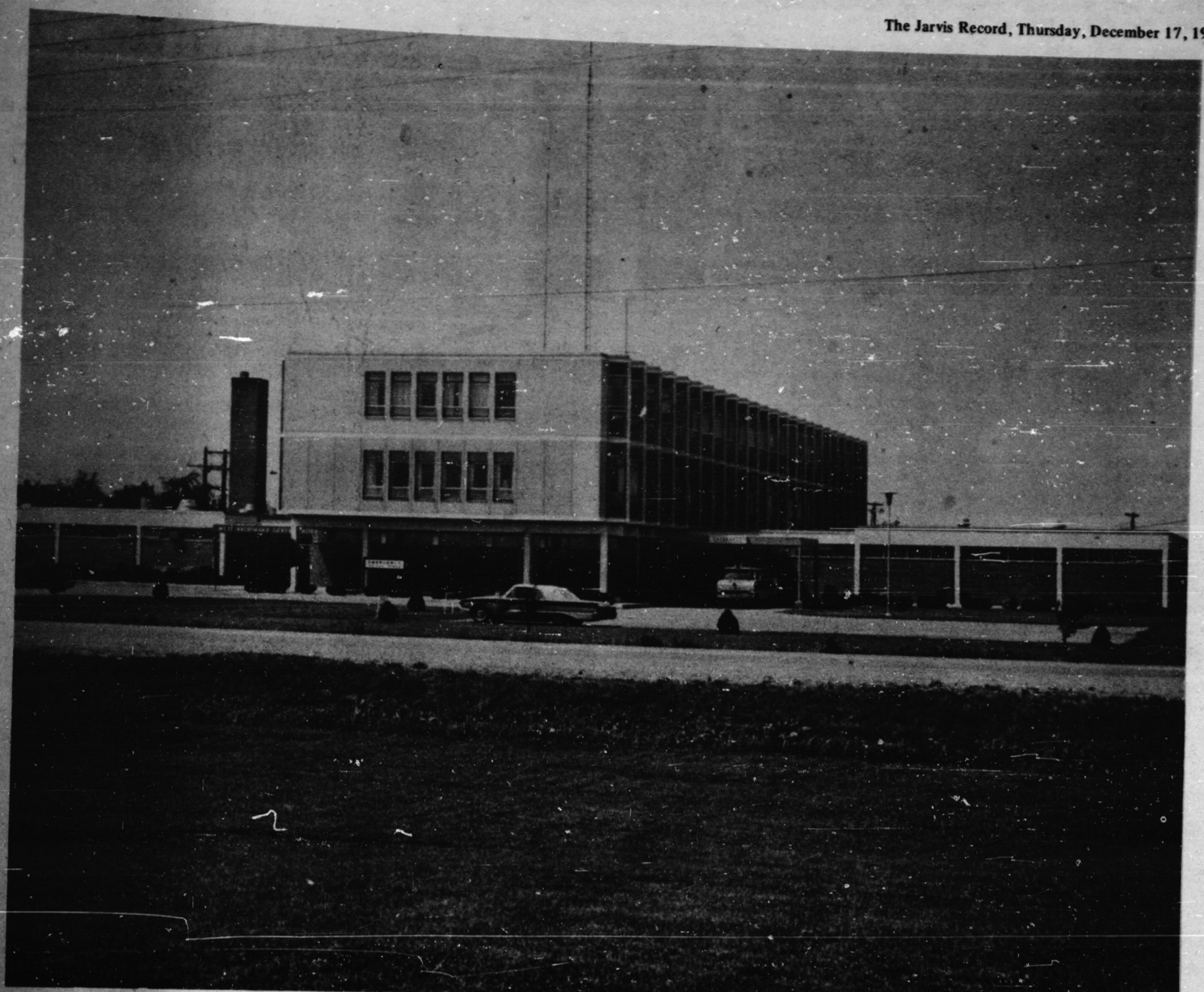
## DIET PROBLEMS

## National Agriculture Marketing A Must

Canadian agriculture will disintegrate unless it gets national marketing legislation, according to Canada's two biggest pig farmer organizations.

The Canadian Swine Council and the Ontario Hog Producers' Marketing Board are both urging swift passage through the House of Commons of Bill C-176. This is a bill to enact national agricultural marketing legislation.

Eric Alderson, president of the Canadian Swine Council, said recently: "We've seen what

happened with broilers and eggs - provinces have erected barriers to their free trade. This is an impossible situation. We must have national marketing legislation to allow producers to work out difficulties like this. We need it now, before provinces start erecting barriers to free trade in pigs, or cattle, or potatoes."

The Ontario Hog Producers Marketing Board has the same view. "We must get this bill through the House in a broadly acceptable form as soon as possible," said secretary,

Jim Boynton. "It's important this bill doesn't exempt any commodity. This is enabling legislation, nothing more. If producers of a certain commodity don't want to use it, that's fine, they don't have to. But the legislation should be there all the same," he said.

The Canadian Swine Council is considering the creation of a National Hog Board if the national marketing legislation is passed. Mr. Alderson says the board would promote and co-ordinate export trade in pork.

## Safety Pointers For A Merry Christmas

Everyone wants to have a merry Christmas - and one way to ensure this is to practice safety in the home during the festive season. Mr. Hal Wright, safety specialist with the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food, recommends these Christmas safety tips:

**The Tree** - Cut about one inch off the trunk and place the tree securely in a water-filled container. Place the tree away from fire-places, heaters and entrances to avoid possible fire hazard. Refill the container regularly.

**Lights** - Never use electric lights on metal trees as they immediately become 'live' if the string

short-circuits. Use indirect lighting instead, and turn off all tree lights before leaving the house.

**Decorations** - Use non-combustibles such as glass or other flame retardant materials.

**Gifts** - Make sure that all toys carry a CSA (Canadian Standard Association) label of approval.
